Huntsville Begins Accepting Business License Renewals

It's that time of year again for Huntsville business owners to make plans to renew their operating license for 2025.

Existing business owners may start submitting their renewals on Jan. 2 through the City's online portal. The deadline is Jan. 31.

While online renewals are preferred, new or existing business owners wanting to submit applications or renewal information in person can do so on the third floor of City Hall, 305 Fountain Circle, during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Businesses needing to update information, including address or contact information, can do so by submitting an Account Maintenance Form. Additionally, if a business



plans to close, this form will also allow owners to finalize their account. For more in-

Valley Weekly How to Prevent the Spread of Germs This Cold and Flu Season

(BPT) - Chilly temperatures and winter weather aren't the only burden that comes with this time of year - it's also the peak of cold and flu season. 

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



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Michael Vick and the new "Statues of Liberty/Ellis Islands": HBCUs

On Monday, December 23, former eight-time NFL All-Pro Michael Vick was introduced as the new head football coach at Norfolk State University (NSU), Virginia's largest historically Black College or University (HBCU).

(Psst: Add to this list three-time Pro Bowler DeSean Jackson, rumored to soon coach at Delaware State, <u>NFL star expected to take over as HBCU head coach</u>.)

Vick's hiring represents the recent trend of some former pro football stars beginning their college coaching careers at HBCUs.

Most notable HBCU coaching "freshmen" are former NFL All-Pros Eddie George (2021, Tennessee State), and Deion Sanders (2020, Jackson State).

HBCUs: New "Statues of Liberty/Ellis Islands"?

According to Bishop Kim Brown, NSU Board of Visitors chairman, at its press conference, Vick's hiring shows "what HBCUs are all about. Today, we put on full display the mission of HBCUs, . . . We provide opportunity," <u>At Norfolk State, will Michael Vick be the next Deion Sanders?</u>.

HBCUs have always provided opportunities for those just starting out, and seeking to move up - just like modern-day Statues of Liberty and Ellis Islands.

From 1892 to 1954, nearly 11 million immigrants from Europe, Africa, and the Carribbeans began their search for better lives and opportunities through New York Harbor's Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. Before these immigrants fanned out across the country, Lady Liberty symbolized the "what" of freedom while Ellis Island's disembarkation represented the "how" they would achieve their first steps toward their American Dream.

The "Coach Prime" Effect

And many of these immigrants-turned-college professors began their careers in HBCU classrooms before Deion Sanders, Eddie George, and Michael Vick arrived on their coaching fields.

After that initial HBCU launchpad, many of these immigrant professors moved on to major universities. And so will these coaches, following Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders' example.

After winning two consecutive conference championships at Jackson State - along with making a sizable economic impact on that school and capitol city, <u>Coach Prime, JSU Tigers 2022</u> <u>Economic Impact on City of Jackson</u>, Sanders moved on to the University of Colorado; is creating there a similar financial boom, <u>The 'Prime Effect' is real at Colorado. How long</u> <u>will Deion Sanders stay is a lingering question | AP News</u>; and has become the first HBCUoriginated coach to produce the first HBCU-originated Heisman Trophy winner, Travis Hunter, <u>https://bit.ly/4fBhc8V</u>!

Become your organization's Sanders, George, and now Michael Vick. How? Embody the slogan for HBCU Alabama A&M University: "Start Here, Go Anywhere."



Rosetta James Foundation "Spotlight on Our Elders" ... Featuring Mr. Charles Vedane


Charles "Chuck" Richard Vedane was born December 6, 1934, on a farm south of Lewis, Iowa, one of the three sons of Victor & Della Vedane. "Chuck" Vedane graduated from Menlo High School in May 1952 and set out operating a farm adjacent to his parents. By 1953, he was drafted into the U.S. Army and took basic training and anti-aircraft artillery radar operations training at Ft. Bliss, Tex. Following this intense training, Vedane was assigned to a base outside of Niagara Falls, N.Y.

From 1955-58, Vedance entered St. Louis University's Parks College of Aeronautical Technology, from which he graduated with a B.S. in aeronautics, and he secured an airframe and engine license and a private pilot's license.

Vedane's productive career includes extensive stints with the Army Ballistic Missile Command in Huntsville, Ala., where he was responsible for systems testing of Jupiter and Jupiter R&D ICBMs; Marshall Space Flight Center, where he tested Mercury Redstone 1 & 2 and the early Saturn 1 vehicles; Teledyne Brown Engineering, where he organized and managed a Space Operations Department that would eventually employ about 220 people., as well as served as technical director for Systems Integration with the responsibility for managing 330 people.

As a member of Trinity Methodist Church, Vedane in 1963 became involved in church and community affairs in response to the racial strife throughout the nation. He prepared a letter from Trinity's Sunday School Class to the newly elected Governor George C. Wallace informing him that the Governor's historic "stand in the schoolhouse door" at the University of Alabama was not approved of. This decision has led to more than 50 years of work within the interfaith religious community to promote better relations across religious, racial, and cultural differences.

Vedane also represented Trinity Methodist Church during the organization and formation of an interfaith cooperative known as the Interfaith Mission Service. The mission of the cooperative is help the member congregations grow their capability and capacity to provide direct services



and systemtic change in the areas of social justice, racial and inter-religious relations.

Vedane, who ran for Huntsville mayor in 1976, has been actively involved in a number of other volunteer efforts, as well. For instance, he was an organizer and a founding member of the Huntsville Emergency Line Program (HELPline); the Huntsville Interfaith Volunteer Transportation Service (HIVTS), later absorbed by the Senior Center; Care Assurance System for the Aging (CASA); and AL IMPACT, a faithbased statewide organization to educate the public and advocate for improved public policies in the area of social welfare and justice.

Vedane and his late wife Lucy have two sons (Scott and Kyle) and a daughter (Rebecca).

NOTES OF A NATIVE SON

ALIEN NATION: Existing Among Them or Living as One

There is an ongoing debate regarding the presence of life on Mars and/or other planets. On August 6, 1996, NASA scientists announced that they found evidence of ancient life on Mars in the meteorite ALH 84001, which was collected in Antarctica. We hear of these findings and relegate them as background noise to the sound track of our lives. We simply don't believe or won't because of how we have been instructed to believe. What if there are "99 other unfallen worlds"? What if we are not really living our own lives? What if we are living this life on someone else's terms? What if we are just falling into line based on patterns set by algorithms and social conditioning? The aptly crowned father of Afrofuturism, musician and philosopher Sun Ra, also from Alabama, spoke of being from another planet, of visiting other worlds. Many, if not most of us, would dismiss this idea or ideal as ridiculous or delusional at best.

Take note that Sun Ra's drummer, Marshall Allen was still touring ... at 100 years old as of May 25, 2024.

In one of the X-Men movies, Aurora and Jean are having a hard time accepting what Kurt is telling them about himself. He responds with these paradigm shifting words: "Most people will only believe what they see with their own two eyes." How limiting that is. This leaves no room for faith or knowing outside of the box. Often when people dare to veer outside the box, they are alienated. Few things are taken into mainstream belief until accepted and co-opted by the status quo. So, most people shuffle through life in quiet desperation, sipping on the tea of forgetfulness, sweetened with a heaping spoonful of groupthink.

The other day I wrestled with this subject and the alien nature of it all. I know where my feet have trod and my mind has traveled. It's been a journey, I tell



you. How many others must also experience the same revelations only to shut them down by the voices of reason encroaching from the outside. All the way home, the ideas of Martians, aliens or whatever else might be out there, here with us or be us, orbited my mind. A short while after arriving home, I received a call from my first born daughter, asking me to go outside and look to the sky (she lives around the corner). I did, and there loomed a luminescent starry light.

First, I went through every logical explanation on what it could be. It sat beneath the heavy cloud bank and never moved. It was not a plane or satellite. I finally came inside, knowing what the title of this blog would be. The idea of alienation is inseparable from the idea of living life on our own terms.

What if being alien wasn't about being apart, but being apart from fear? What if we chose courage over comfort, purpose over approval? What if we chose to live on our own terms, breaking free from the quiet desperation of fitting into lives designed by others? Instead of surviving on what's "dished out," what if we take the raw ingredients of our existence—flawed, messy, miraculous—and create something true and relevant?

The bottom line is that we are all aliens here-strangers to each other, to ourselves, and to the dreams we've been handed, like unwanted but accepted old handme-downs. Personal alienation feels as vast and cold as outer space, where the rules of survival aren't written for us or by us but imposed by someone else's limited idea of life space. Are we willing to go where no man has gone before?

Imagine no longer waiting for permission to dream your dream, to love, to thrive in your own rhythm. Imagine a life where alienation isn't exile but liberation, where we reclaim our space and write our narra-



tive among the stars, rather than shrinking into the dark corners of someone else's dream ... or nightmare.

To live fully, boldly, is to embrace the alien within-odd, radiant, and untethered. Life isn't meant to be spent in the shadow of someone else's vision. It's meant to be lived, fully and unapologetically, in the brilliance of our own light. On this planet, where the dishes are often unpalatable and shaped by others, let us become the master chef of our own feasts, the architects of our own worlds. I've caught long glimpses and I know they exist ...

Would you dare to be alien enough to live your dream?
