HU Ends Six-Month Utilities Pause

Huntsville Utilities has resumed issuing late-fee assessments and service disconnections following a six-month pause stemming from its new software system.

"While we do not traditionally offer payment ar-

rangements any longer," explained Gary T. Whitley, Jr., HU community relations manager, "customers can reach out to us if they have issues with their account, as well as they can reach out to local agencies for bill assistance."

HU began phasing out its former payment arrangement method last summer.

The Salvation Army operates Project Share, funded by Huntsville Utilities. The program provides income-based assistance after a screening process.

Drake Head to Return to Port Authority Board

Governor Kay Ivey has reappointed Drake State Community & Technical College President Dr. Patricia Sims to the Alabama Port Authority Board of Directors. Sims will serve as the representative of the Northern District. Dr. Sims previously served on the Port Authority board from August 2020 through July 2025, completing her first five-year term. Mr. Tony Cochran and the Honorable San-

dy Stimpson were also reappointed to the board.

Established by legislative act in 2000, the nine-member Port Authority board holds fiscal and policy oversight for the public seaport. The Port Authority owns and operates the State of Alabama's deep-water port facilities at the Port of Mobile, one of the nation's largest seaports.


"It's an honor to continue serving on the Port Author-



ity board," said Dr. Sims. "The work we've been doing is critical to Alabama's economy, and I look forward to building on the progress we've made as we advance the Port's strategic initiatives."

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Washington One Minute

Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington, D.C.:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The Senate will take up the package of 3 FY2026 appropriations bills (Commerce, Energy & Water, and Interior) that the House passed last week on a 397-28 vote. In a surprise 52-47 vote last week (with 5 Republicans voting with the Democrats), the Senate voted to discharge a resolution out of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee directing the removal of U.S. Armed Forces from hostilities within or against Venezuela that have not been authorized by Congress (the Senate will take further action on the resolution this week). Last week, the House failed to overturn 2 presidential vetoes of Florida- and Colorado-specific bills and then approved a 3-year extension of the COVID-era Obamacare subsidies (forced by a Democratic-led discharge petition) - on a 230-

196 vote with 17 Rs joining all Ds. On Sunday, the House Appropriations Committee released the text of a 2-bill package containing the State/National Security and Financial Services/General Government funding bills providing \$76 billion to fund the State and Treasury Departments and the federal judiciary. The House is expected to vote on the package this week. (NOTE: the Homeland Security appropriations bill was originally the 3rd bill in this package, but reportedly was dropped due to objections from various Members of Congress after last Wednesday's ICE shooting in Minneapolis, at which protestor Renee Good was killed.)

2. EXECUTIVE BRANCH. The White House announced last week that the President will deliver his State of the Union address to a Joint Session of Congress on February 24. Last Friday, the President met with U.S. oil and gas executives representing 17

companies, including Chevron, Exxon, ConocoPhillips, and Halliburton, to discuss investments in Venezuela. He also cautioned that oil companies will not be able to recoup past losses and, to emphasize that point, issued an executive order on Friday to prevent lawsuits from seizing Venezuelan oil revenues held in U.S. Treasury accounts. Also last Friday, the President called on credit card companies to cap interest rates at 10% for 1 year starting on Jan 20, mirroring legislation proposed last year by Sen. Bernie Sanders (I-VT) and Josh Hawley (R-MO). On Tuesday, the President will travel to Detroit to deliver remarks on the economy to the Detroit Economic Club at the MotorCity Casino Sound Board Theatre.

3. SUPREME COURT. On Tuesday, the Court will take up the cases of Little v. Hecox and West Virginia v. B. P. J., on challenges to the constitutionality of laws in Idaho and West Virginia that prohibit transgender women and girls from participating on women's and girls' sports teams.

The Court is scheduled to release opinions from its current docket this Wednesday, which may include rulings on the President's tariffs and

Section II of the Voting Rights Act.

4. DECEMBER JOBS REPORT/POWELL LAW-SUIT. On Friday, the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that the U.S. economy added only 50,000 jobs in December, after a downward revision of 56,000 in November (economists had predicted 60,000 jobs added). With job growth slowing more than expected in December amid business caution about hiring due to import tariffs and rising artificial intelligence investment, and with the unemployment rate dipping to 4.4%, the Federal Reserve is expected to leave interest rates unchanged at its next meeting on January 27-28. In related news, The New York Times reported Sunday that the U.S. attorney's office in the District of Columbia has opened a criminal investigation into Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell over the central bank's

renovation of its Washington headquarters and whether Mr. Powell lied to Congress about the scope of the project (on Sunday night, Powell released a defiant video accusing the administration of jeopardizing the future of the Fed). Punchbowl News reported that Sen. Thom Tillis (R-NC) quickly threatened to block any Trump nominee for the Fed until the issue is resolved.

5. HIGHER EDUCATION. On Friday, the Education Department's AHEAD negotiated-rulemaking committee reached an unexpected consensus on accountability regulations, requiring ED to use the panel's draft when issuing the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking in the coming months. The regulations align the new accountability framework from the One Big Beautiful Bill Act with existing Gainful Employment rules, measuring programs by whether graduates' median


earnings exceed those of high school completers. Most programs that fail the earnings premium test will lose only Direct Loan eligibility rather than full Title IV access, with complete ineligibility reserved for extreme cases, which is unlikely to affect community colleges. Additional changes include a "teach-out" process after the first year of failure and the restoration of certain reporting requirements removed from ED's initial draft. Loan ineligibility generally kicks in after a program fails the metric in two out of three consecutive years.

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America’s Conscience on Trial: The Killing of Renee Good


The killing of Renee Nicole Good, a 37-year-old U.S. citizen, poet, mother, and college graduate, is yet another heartbreaking symptom of how far our nation has strayed from its professed values. Good, a graduate of Old Dominion University with a degree in English and a poetry prize to her name, was known by her family as “kind, compassionate, loving and forgiving.” She was a wife and the devoted mother of three children — a 6-year-old son, a 12-year-old son, and a 15-year-old daughter — who now face an unthinkable future without her.

On January 7, 2026, while driving after dropping her youngest child at school, Good was shot and killed by an ICE agent in Minneapolis. Federal officials quickly labelled her actions as “domestic terrorism” — even as video and eyewitness accounts raise serious questions about that narrative. Yet here is the tragic irony: a woman described by friends and family as not politically active and not a threat was immediately branded a terrorist by the highest levels of government before the facts were fully out.

This is no isolated tragedy — it is a stark indictment of a leadership that increasingly sees compassionate Americans as enemies and justifies deadly force with reckless rhetoric. Our nation’s moral compass is spinning, and Renee Good’s death should shock every conscience. When a mother, a poet, an everyday American can be killed by agents of the United States and dismissed with dehumanizing labels, we must ask: what have we become?

America must reckon with this moment — not with more fear, not with more division, but with a renewed commitment to human dignity, accountability, and justice. Renee Good deserved better. Her children deserve better. Our country deserves better!

He has given you a gift; open it

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
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Richard Smallwood and his Oakwood College Legacy will not be forgotten!

“Consolation, yet celebration” are the two opposite emotions that describe the passing yet legacy of music legend Richard Smallwood with Huntsville’s Oakwood College-now-University.

- 1) His first piano teacher was recording artist Roberta Flack, whose first piano teacher was Ms. Alma Blackmon Director of Oakwood’s Aeolians choir, (1973-1985).
- 2) During my time as the school’s PR Director and Aeolians tour manager, their rich eight-part harmonies accompanied such legends as Lee Greenwood (country, 1998), Ms. Kathleen Battle (classical, 2000?), and Friday, December 3, 1999’s all-day workshop and evening concert with Smallwood.
- 3) That Friday marked the end of the fall semester, and these Aeolians were noticeably exhausted. At the end of their rehearsal session, he turned to these choristers and quipped, “y’all need to either get some sleep or some alcohol – **or whatever you Adventists do!** – for this evening’s concert!” It worked as they later performed superbly with him to a standing-room-only Oakwood Church crowd.
- 4) Earlier that day, I introduced him to the school’s religion professor and wife, Dr. Mervyn and Mrs. Barbara Warren, whose son Mervyn composed the orchestral opening to Smallwood’s classic “Total Praise” anthem in 1996.
- 5) In September 2000, the choir ended a weekend whirlwind of Washington DC concerts at Metropolitan Baptist Church. Not only did he welcome them to his home church by sharing with them that he had just concertized in Philadelphia several hours earlier, but rushed back driving to not only hear them, but to accompany them playing his original composition, “That Name,” popularized by Miss Yolanda Adams. Wow! And
- 6) In May 2004 and now as an independent publicist, I promoted the debut concert of then-future Oakwoodite sisters, Guille, Patria, and Marissa Juzang with their featured guest artists, Richard Smallwood and Vision (with its Oakwoodite chorister Shawn Hayden), as he had just completed his Masters of Divinity degree at Howard University.



Leadership expert Dr. John C. Maxwell differentiates inheritance from legacy. Whereas “inheritance” is what one leaves one’s family after their death, “legacy” is what you put in your family *during* your life.

Therefore, and by definition, I celebrate being a part of the family and legacy of Richard Smallwood. What I had fantasized in late 2025, I will now implement in 2026: thanks to Richard Smallwood and his legacy of sacred and classical music, academic preparation, and just flat out servant leadership, I will resume my piano lessons – *after a 60-year hiatus!*



Born in Chapman, Alabama, the Elder Dr. Oscar L. Montgomery is a lifelong visionary whose drive to make an impact grew throughout elementary and high school.

He has a lengthy list of academic accomplishments. He earned the Doctorate of Ministry from Trinity Theological Seminary, Newburgh, Indiana – Pastoral Ministries; Ph.D. and M.S. degrees from Purdue University; and a Bachelor of Science degree from Alabama A&M University in agronomy/chemistry. While impressive, these academic pearls have not been his driving force.

It is his love and concern for the "least of these my brethren" that really drives him. His devotion to making the world a better place for all has driven his major decisions in life. He spent 22 years at Alabama A&M University serving as a professor, researcher, and administrator.

As he served in these different positions (i.e., director of external affairs, executive assistant to the president for institutional advancement and development, director of grants and contracts, vice president for student affairs, and vice president of research and development), he always had the students as his top priority. His end goal was always to make life easier and better for the students he served.

In 1977, while still employed at Alabama A&M University, Pastor Montgomery heeded his call to

become pastor of Union Hill Primitive Baptist Church. His small congregation of 35 to 50 has grown to over 700 members and more than 2,000 have passed through these sacred doors and have moved on to spread the "Good News" about Jesus, Union Hill and Pastor Montgomery's vision all over the world. There are few places you can go without someone saying, "I used to go to Union Hill, how is Pastor Montgomery?" He has demonstrated that he is a shepherd sent from the heart of God. Indeed, he has a heart for winning souls, making disciples and feeding people by sharing his knowledge and understanding of the Word of God. As God leads him, so he leads.

Dr. Montgomery is known for his unselfish and untiring leadership among his many religious, civic and community affiliations. 

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AUNT IRMA MAKES IT PLAIN...

When Dreams Become Someone Else's Business

Baby, pull up a chair and let Aunt Irma finish this thought properly—because this one deserves a little more room to breathe.

Somewhere along the way, aspiration became one of the most profitable raw materials in America. Not oil. Not gold. *Hope*. And far too many folks are getting rich not by helping people reach their dreams—but by selling the idea of getting there.

Just look around.

Every creative field now has a shadow economy attached to it. If you're a musician, somebody is always ready to sell you studio time, playlist placement, promo bundles, "industry showcases," or a mysterious algorithm fix. If you're an author, there are publishers who don't distribute, editors who don't edit deeply, and marketers who promise buzz but deliver silence—yet every invoice clears just fine. Actors? Whew. Classes stacked on classes, headshots every year, reels, subscriptions, casting portals, pay-to-audition systems, and "exposure opportunities" that somehow never expose you to a paycheck.



Notice the common thread? The dreamer always pays first. The gatekeeper never does.

This is the monetization of aspiration: a system that doesn't profit from your success but from your persistence. From your belief that you're "one more step" away. From your willingness to keep investing even when the returns never show up. In fact, success would actually interrupt the business model. If too many people broke through, who would keep buying hope in monthly installments?

Now Aunt Irma wants to be clear. There is nothing wrong with investing in yourself. Training matters. Education matters. Skill development costs money. Expertise should be compensated. Nobody expects free labor—except, oddly enough, when it comes to your dreams.

But there's a sharp line between investment and extraction.

Predatory systems always speak in encouragement. "We believe in you." "Your moment is coming." "You're so close." Real opportunity doesn't

need poetry. It comes with transparency, clear outcomes, and shared risk. If someone gets paid whether you succeed or fail, pause. If they can't show where others have landed—not just testimonials, but outcomes—pause longer.

And Black folks, listen closely. Our history of exclusion makes us especially vulnerable to access-for-sale schemes. When doors have been locked for generations, anyone offering a key suddenly sounds trustworthy. Too many enterprises quietly assume we'll keep paying

just to be considered, just to be seen, just to be in the room.


Dreams are sacred. They deserve protection, not perpetual billing.

So before you swipe the card, sign the contract, or click "submit," ask the question Aunt Irma lives by: Who profits if this never works?

If the answer isn't you, that's not opportunity—that's inventory.

And Aunt Irma doesn't want you on anyone's shelf.

N. Huntsville Shopping District Advances

Huntsville's latest new retail district continues to expand and progresses towards construction later this year.

The City approved a contract with Schoel Engineering Company for engineering design and construction administration services for public infrastructure improvements related to the North Village Town Center project at Memorial Parkway and State Route 255 (Northern Bypass). The scope of work includes design and engineering services for general



mass grading, utilities, and additional roadway improvements for the area.

The City last month announced the \$240 million development, which will be anchored by Target and Home Depot. Upon completion, the project will consist of over 600,000 sq. ft. of new retail shops and restaurants.

On the northern side of State Route 255 directly across from North Village Town Center, the City also agreed to sell 15.23 acres of land to Hank Holdings LLC. The property will be developed to deliver additional retail and restaurant tenants to the North Huntsville retail district.

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
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
