

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Washington in One Minute



Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., for this week's edition.

The House and Senate are in session this week, although it's a short week in the House with votes only until Wednesday afternoon, because the House GOP Retreat had been scheduled (and then canceled) for the end of the week at the Greenbrier Resort in West Virginia.

1. As part of the deal that Congress passed on Friday to reopen the federal government, the House and Senate appointed conferees to the FY2019 Homeland Security Appropriations bill, which will serve as the main forum for a group of bipartisan lawmakers to attempt to come to a deal on the border security issue.

The conference committee conferees are as follows (House GOP Members have not yet been appointed): Senate Appropriations Chair Richard Shelby (R-AL); Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV); Sen. John Hoeven (R-ND); Sen. Roy Blunt (R-MO); Senate Appropriations Ranking Democrat Patrick Leahy (D-VT); Sen. Dick Durbin (D-IL); Sen. Jon Tester (D-MT); House Appro-

priations Chair Nita Lowey (D-NY); Rep. Lucille Roybal-Allard (D-CA); Rep. David Price (D-NC); Rep. Barbara Lee (D-CA); Rep. Henry Cuellar (R-TX); and Rep. Pete Aguilar (D-CA).

2. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) told reporters on Friday that, despite the reopening of the federal government, she will not invite President Trump to deliver his State of the Union Address that had been planned for Tuesday night (Jan. 29). The Speaker said that she would be negotiating a new date with the President.

3. Reps. Gerald Connolly (D-VA) and Steny Hoyer (D-MD) have introduced legislation to grant a 2.6% pay raise to civilian federal employees to match the pay raise that has gone into effect for 2019 for members of the armed forces.

The Connolly/Hoyer bill was scheduled to be debated on the House floor on Wednesday. President Trump issued an Executive Order a few weeks ago prohibiting the pay raise for civilian employees.

4. The Senate Judiciary Committee has scheduled

least a week.

5. Wednesday was the last day to comment on DeVos' proposed rules for how schools handle sexual assault allegations. The proposal had drawn nearly 72,000 comments as of Sunday.

Among those weighing in are 147 lawmakers from 40 states and D.C., who say the proposal would "undermine state laws protecting student rights."

6. A new NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll of 900 adults conducted on Jan. 20-23 finds that 63% of Americans believe the country is headed in the wrong direction and nearly 70% have negative opinions on the state of the nation today most often using the terms "turmoil," "disarray," and "shambles" to describe their feelings.

However, the poll showed that President Trump's approval rating remained at a steady 43% during the shutdown.
