According to Blanchard, "Racial identity, or the significance and meaning that individuals attribute to race, is recognized as a key factor in how African Americans cope with racism

experiences. Unfortunately, however, the few studies that have examined African Americans' responses to racist events have failed to account for differences across situations that African Americans experience, making it difficult to ascertain whether differences in coping are due to person variables, the situation, or both."

In the book, Blanchard adopted a stress and coping approach to examine the relations among racial identity, racism-related stress appraisal, and coping with lifetime racism experiences.

Healthy Heart Contest Ongoing







Portrait of a Civil Rights Hero

During Black History Month, we focus on history-making African-American men and women you made a difference in the life, history and culture of this nation. I walked with one who embodies that theme. I can see "Zeke" Bell back in the 1960s sitting in my family home all by himself, telling my parents about the vision he had for the children of the community and to let go and trust him. He walked from house to house in the Edmonton Heights community like the piped pier "collecting" children.

There was a two-lane highway with no sidewalks and 100-150 children at any time followed behind this one man. During the summer months, he would ask the local teachers and stay-athome parents to volunteer at the church, and we would spend the entire day at the church engaged in discussions, singing, eating, Bible study, baseball games and falling off the jungle gym. He knew everyone's name. In recent years when he returned several years for our church anniversaries he would still say, "You are one of the Burruss girls."

tell you about him picking them up and transporting them to the polling centers so they could vote. Children can tell you about the Christmas he was determined we were going Christmas caroling in freezing conditions.

Stokley Gardner (who sadly we lost last week) tells about the men of Fellowship Church Presbyterian standing watch at his home on Whitney when Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Rev. Ralph Abernathy stayed at his home before delivering speeches at First Missionary Baptist Church and Oakwood College. If you needed a ride, get in the green station wagon.

Rev. Bell arrived in Huntsville in the late summer of 1959 to start Fellowship Presbyterian Church on Meridian Street, his


first church. As a student at the University of Chicago Seminary School, he and some other students made a pact to change the world in the next five years. In the house, Bell began the business of changing conditions in Huntsville. Earlier in 1962, he had been named the chair of the Community Service Committee, the city's first civil rights organization. The Community Service Committee held weekly meetings, organized prayer marches and picket lines at stores that discriminated against African Americans. He brought in leaders from other sit-in campaigns, such as Reverend James Lawson from the famous 1960 Nashville, Tennessee, sit-in.

Rev. Bell was the founding president of the Memphis Chapter of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. He played a lead role in the late 1960s, alongside activists Maxine Smith and Leroy Clark in the nonviolent school boycotts, now known as Black Mondays. Later, as the only Black Presbyterian minister in Memphis, he supported the 1967 strike of the local sanitation workers. Rev. Bell was steadfast in finding ways to open doors for his fellow African Americans and fighting the racism that threatened their pursuit of the American dream.

Thank you for teaching and reinforcing in me that I

am somebody!

CUCINA ITALIANA™

Huntsville's success prompts Columbus, Ohio-based Bravo/ Brio Restaurant Group to open its first location at Bridge Street.

Last week, I had the pleasure of dining at BridgeStreet's newest restaurant – Bravo! "Cucina Italiana," which means Italian Kitchen. While many restaurants at BridgeStreet have come and gone, Bravo! is located in a new facility next to DSW Shoes, so hopefully it will last.

While at Bravo! I enjoyed an entrée of tilapia that was stuffed with shrimp and topped with lump crab meat. It was simply delicious.

This entrée was served with sautéed vegetable medley of potatoes, carrots and green beans. I'm sure that this dish was filled with more calories than I needed, but it was a taste of heaven on my palate. Although this entrée was priced above \$20, the menu offers a favorite of non-seafood entrée dishes that range from \$8

up to \$30.

Listed on the menu was a lobster bisque soup, but they were out, so I did not get to taste it as both my server and the restaurant general manager pleaded that their version is better than Connor's – which is the best I've tasted. So, I will have to go back soon to try this lobster bisque. I will be sure to share my review of the soup once I have tried it for myself.

According to the company, "Bravo! Cucina Italiana is a polished casual restaurant offering classic Italian food among the shadows of Roman ruins. Cooking is done in the full view of the guest." Bravo! will be open for lunch and dinner seven days a week, and will offer Brunch on Sunday until 3 p.m.

As with most new restaurants in Huntsville, the first weeks are likely to be crowded, but it will be worth the wait.

New Priest Expecting Gradual Growth

Although she has yet to complete her first full year at Holy Cross-St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, Rev. Diane Hill fervently

believes growth is definitely in the future for small parish situated on Meridian Street.
