Legislator Becomes House Minority Leader

Alabama State Representative Anthony Daniels was recently elected Minority Leader by his colleagues in the Democratic House Caucus, making the 34-year-old the youngest and first African American to be named to the post in modern state history. Daniels also ranks among the youngest party leaders nationwide.

"I am humbled by the faith, trust and support provided by my colleagues in Montgomery, and I'm looking forward to getting to work," Daniels said. "Democrats are ready to roll up their sleeves to boost public education, to help businesses create good-paying jobs, and to restore public confidence in Montgomery among the hard-working families of Alabama."

Rep. Daniels grew up in Midway, Ala., was first

elected to the House in 2014, and has spent his career determined to boost jobs, public education, and college affordability. He has served as an educator, a fundraiser for Alabama A&M University and as a member of Huntsville's Economic Sustainability Council, among other positions. He currently operates a small business in North Alabama.

In 2016, Daniels introduced two bills which eventually became law. The first, known as the "Growler Bill", allows small brewers to sell their product for off-site consumption, boosting the economy and encouraging Alabama breweries to expand. Daniels also introduced the 21st Century Manufac-

ing Act, which would boost manufacturing and business recruitment by encouraging a greater partnership between industry and local governments.



"As we begin this year's legislative session, we are ready to reach across the aisle and deliver for Alabamians, but we have to focus on our collective needs - not on controversial bills that divide us and makes it more difficult to attract and retain good paying jobs our people need and deserve. That means moving forward on our efforts to build a stronger business climate, boost both K-12 and higher education, and to balance our budget without trying to do so on the backs of our poor, our senior citizens, and our veterans."

giveaways, activities for children, and Chicago Kite.



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Your Washington Recap

Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are in session this week. The House has 5 more Obama-era regulations on its calendar that it will vote to cancel this week, including an executive order that barred states from withdrawing federal funds from clinics, including Planned Parenthood, that provide abortions.

2. President Trump met with Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau Monday at the White House and met with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Wednesday. Over the weekend, White House staffers hinted that the President may issue a new order restricting immigration in view of the 9th Circuit Appeal Court's refusal last week to lift a stay imposed on his

current ban by a federal judge in Seattle.

3. According to Saturday's Washington Post, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raided homes and workplaces and took hundreds of undocumented immigrants into custody in Atlanta, Chicago, New York, Los Angeles, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Kansas, Texas and Northern Virginia in actions that started on Monday and ended Friday at noon.

4. According to Politico, GOP House Members held an emergency closed-door meeting last week and listened to tips from former county sheriff Rep. Dave Reichert (R-WA) on how to protect themselves from angry crowds at their local town hall meetings.

5. Last Wednesday, Public

Citizen, the NRDC, and the Communication Workers of America filed a federal suit against President Trump's January 30 executive order that requires that federal agencies may only issue a new regulation if they rescind 2 existing regulations. The lawsuit alleges that the President exceed his authority in issuing the order.

6. Nine directors of centers of higher education at universities across the country have sent Jerry Falwell, Jr., who is reportedly leading a task force on higher education reform for President Trump, a list of seven "keystone challenges" facing the industry.

7. On Saturday, the New York Times reported that White House Press Secretary Sean Spicer's daily press briefings are a ratings hit, getting 4.3 million viewers on average, beating soap operas like *The Bold and the Beautiful* and *General Hospital*, which air in the same time slot.

So some of our readers might have put 2 and 2 together by now. Late last year, The Delta Theta Lambda Education Foundation of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., invited the community to make nominations for the 2017 Unity Award. I called my friend, Butch Damson, and indicated that I wanted to nominate her. Of course, she said "no" and that conversation ended. I didn't accept her answer. I proceeded to call people I knew, to include calling and going over to St. Joseph Catholic Parish to pick up one of their anniversary books. I talked to our mutual friend, Dr. Charles Smoot, who directed me to resources that I *knew* existed; however, I didn't know where or how to find them.

Givers are typically people who do not want others to give to them. Bill and I have an agreement that he will not work with anyone to plan anything for me, where people have to give to me: from birthdays to anniversaries to special holidays and honors and awards. So, to the persons who nominated me, I can assure you that Bill was no help. Always, I want to be the person *giving*.

I was so busy getting Butch's nomination together, I never thought about who else might be honored. That was not important. Typically, we attend the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Unity Breakfast each year, so we, like so many other local citizens, would be there anyway--regardless. It's an important occasion in the life of America and in our City.

The breakfast is held annually on the Monday of the official Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., national holiday. Federal and state government organizations are closed; therefore, there is no compelling reason as to why we wouldn't go. And, Butch was pleased to learn many things that she did not know about Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity. For instance, Alpha was the first intercollegiate Greek-lettered fraternity for African-American men. Founded in 1906 at Cornell University, Dr. King was a member. In addition, she knew Wilbert Brown, Dr. Charles Smoot, Gary Whitley and Bill Huston. However, when I told her that they were all members, she thought it that was completely awesome! She knows Wilbert as the former Principal of AAAS, she and Dr. Smoot have been fellow parishioners at St. Joseph Catholic Parish for decades, Gary from our family foundation, and she knows Bill as my side kick.

So, I was not on the line when Wilbert Brown called her, but I can imagine her response, even if it remained unspoken. Her thought was, "I told Dorothy, 'no' but she is hard-headed." So, Butch, from one hard-head to another, *Congratulations!* I cannot think of anyone more deserving of this honor. You are a unifier, and your response about 'race not mattering' when you close your eyes and hold the person's hand next to you is a lesson that still has not been learned by many of us. Actually, it's a lesson not taught or talked about enough. The longer I live, the more I learn about the things that are truly important in life. With that said, the older I get, the more I observe that so many of us refuse to practice what we know to be the "right" thing to do. We go through the mechanics of life, work, church, clubs, and organizations, but we never reach the pinnacle of really living the things about which we talk and espouse. Some of my greatest disappointments in life have been shared with people I knew and trusted. To the contrary, some of my greatest joys have been experienced with strangers and random people who had no real expectations about how I might share or give. Dr. Richard Showers insisted on Butch and I meeting. I said "no" several times, but Butch persisted. I am so glad that she is hard-headed like me.

By the way, when Wilbert called me on the Thursday before the breakfast on Monday, my response was "You have got to be kidding!" I then understood why Gary Whitley was selling me so many ads. The event was sold out but there was plenty space in the souvenir booklet. Thanks, COL (Ret.) James Heyward, for allowing our daughter, Katie, to sit with your guests. I didn't have a seat for her because I didn't know she was coming.

Butch Damson is a "game changer," and I am still not sure how I got to share the stage with her! I was working on her behalf, not knowing that someone was working on mine. Life is full of wonderful surprises. I have had my share of God's mercy and grace! I am grateful for each day.

The Huntsville Museum of Art will show the immortalization of noted blues musicians beginning April 23, when the Museum opens "Our Living Past: A Platinum Portrait of Music Makers." The exhibit will run through July 2.

For more than three decades, photographer Tim Duffy has immortalized Southern musical heroes and the world in which they live, not only through the photographs he takes, but also through his Music Maker Relief Foundation, which promotes and supports the enduring tradition of Southern roots music.

"Our Living Past" celebrates this distinctive regional sound through 25 iconic images of living blues musicians, supplemented by an array of related musical instruments and ephemera. Organized by the Music Maker Relief Foundation, Hillsborough, N.C.

However, in a recent press release, Jones announced that Gramm, McDonald and Greenwood would be reuniting for select tour stops this summer.


Program Will Honor Bradfords

The Debutantes choreographed an energetic finale dance routine to a medley of songs which included "Voss", "Pretty Girl Rock", and "Formation".


