Toyota Achieves Manufacturing Milestone



If the 5 million engines that Toyota Motor Manufacturing Alabama has produced over the past 14 years were lined up side by side, they would stretch from Huntsville to Los Angeles!

“Five million, that’s incredible. You just don’t think in those terms,” says Theodore Bridgeforth, a group leader and original

team member who helped bring that first engine forth back in 2003. “It was special, seeing the first engine go from months of planning and design to actually coming off the line.”

To celebrate the milestone, Toyota will donate \$50,000 to the Huntsville Library Foundation, supporting the North Huntsville Library project.

HudsonAlpha Discovers New Gene Signature for Breast Cancer

Discovery could lead to new, targeted therapy for triple negative breast cancer

Huntsville, Ala. — Researchers at the HudsonAlpha Institute for Biotechnology, a nonprofit genetics and genomics research institute in Huntsville, Ala., and collaborators from the University of Alabama (UAB) and the Huntsman Cancer Institute have discovered a new gene signature regulated by a specific transcription factor – proteins that switch genes on and off – that is involved in regulating processes active in triple negative breast cancer. Results from the study were published in

the journal *Oncotarget* last December.

The research was led by then graduate assistant Joy Agee McDaniel, PhD, who recently joined The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center as a postdoctoral fellow. McDaniel lost her best friend, who was only 24 years old, to breast cancer, and the loss motivated her to pursue graduate work at HudsonAlpha in breast cancer research, specifically triple negative breast cancer.

“My research is not only important to me because of my personal connection to breast cancer,” McDaniel said, “but also to men and

women around the world because learning more about the basic biology of triple negative breast cancer will put us one step closer to developing better therapies and saving lives.”

In her time as a graduate assistant trainee in the Myers Lab at HudsonAlpha, McDaniel took a significant step toward meeting her goal. She and her colleagues discovered a new gene signature regulated by the transcription factor STAT3.

“What we found,” McDaniel said, “was that therapies that target STAT3 could prevent metastasis in triple negative breast cancer.” In metastasis, can-

cer cells break away from where they first formed, travel through the blood or lymph system, and form new tumors in other parts of the body.

Triple negative is one of the least treatable and most aggressive forms of breast cancer because it does not respond to hormonal therapies and is usually diagnosed at a later stage. McDaniel points out that while African American women have lower incidence of breast cancer diagnosis compared to white women, African American women have disproportionately lower survival rates from breast cancer.

Alabama show.

Immediately following the tour announcement, Alabamians questioned whether the venue was big enough to host an act with a fan base as strong as Cole’s. Some fans have even gone far enough to create a petition, asking to move the act to a larger venue like the BJCC or Iron City Bham, where the 32-year-old performed a sold out show in 2015.

While Cole has sold out stadium-sized venues, the Rocnation artist said he likes to keep things miniscule and intimate. Hailing from Fayetteville, North Carolina, the “Work Out” singer once stated that coming from a small town encouraged him pay to homage to the areas that most artist usually overlook when touring.

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Your Washington Recap

Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are back in session this week after last week's Presidents' Day Recess. The House this week will take up another regulation-cancelling resolution (this time pertaining to a Labor Department rule on work injury records) and a bill to create a Regulatory Working Group at the White House that will coordinate all regulatory activities government-wide. The Senate will take up the nominations of Commerce Secretary-designee Wilbur Ross and Interior Secretary-designee Ryan Zinke.
2. President Trump, having hosted a party for the nation's Governors at the White House, met them Monday to discuss the repeal of the Affordable Care Act. He also released details on his FY2018 budget proposal, which is expected to call for a sharp increase in defense spending at the expense of other agencies, including EPA and State (but he will not propose cuts to entitlement programs). On Tuesday, he addressed his first Joint Session of Congress - at which he was expected to press Congress to pass legislation on comprehensive tax reform, Obamacare repeal/replacement, regulatory reform, and an infrastructure plan. The Democratic response was delivered by ex-Kentucky Governor Steve

Beshear and the Democrats' Spanish-language response was given by Nevada immigration activist Astrid Silva.

3. House committees were expected to start work this week on the House Republicans' plan to repeal and replace Obamacare, which was leaked to reporters last Friday. It would repeal Obamacare's individual mandate requiring all Americans to purchase health insurance (instead, the draft bill would allow insurers to charge a penalty of up to 30% above the baseline when entering a plan for anyone who lets their coverage lapse). It would also eliminate the taxes used to fund Obamacare subsidies and the expansion of Medicaid and would eliminate funding for Planned Parenthood for one year. The tax subsidies and state expansion of Medicaid would remain in place until 2020 and, after that, individuals would receive tax credits - ranging from \$2,000 annually for the under 30s to \$4,000 for the over 60s.

4. The Supreme Court heard arguments in a North Carolina case in which a man was convicted of violating a state sex offender law by posting comments on his Facebook page about a dismissed traffic ticket, thereby violating the law's prohibition on using a social networking site that he knew was accessed by minors. Two years ago,

the Court struck down the conviction of a man who used Facebook to issue threats against his ex-wife.

5. On Tuesday, the House Judiciary Committee will allow a vote on a resolution offered by Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-NY), which would compel the Attorney General to produce all documents and memos pertaining to foreign investment in the Trump Organization and any investigations targeting President Trump or his staff.

6. A new NBC/Wall Street Journal poll released Sunday finds President Trump's job approval rating still in negative territory (44% approve to 48% disapprove) after 5 weeks in office. However, he beats out Congress, which only has a 29% approval rating. The same poll, however, also found that 53% think the media has exaggerated the problems in the Trump Administration.

7. Senate Democrats are pushing Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos for answers about a new higher education advisory group - reportedly run by Jerry Falwell Jr. - and what role it will play in the administration. Finally, an interesting report on how student veterans, who often have to juggle education with jobs and families, outperform their peers has been released.

Notes from a Native Son

"Artists are the only people who know the truth about us."

- James Baldwin

As an artist, father, educator, and a native son of my Grandcestors who stepped boldly onto this continent well before it was spattered with red white and blue, I stand in that truth. In that truth, I call on another quote by brother Baldwin, "The role of the artist is exactly the same as the role of the lover. If I love you I have to make you conscious of the things you don't see."

I came into the public school system as a little browned eyed hopeful well after the freedom way had been lined with the dreams of those whose blood, sweat and tears now greased the runway. I sat next to blue eyes, hazel eyes, green eyes, and all the rest of the eyes on the prize recipients. We were the products of a movement; the result of a dream and a nightmare that had left this Alabama red clay stained in our forbears' blood. How interesting it was that two children seated right next to each other could be worlds apart. Welcome to America.

We speak sometimes of two Americas, referring to an experience of one white and one black. In truth there are a millions shades and tints of grays sandwiched into a meal of constantly changing appetites. In the wake of the resurrection of James Baldwin in the award-nominated documentary "I Am Not Your Negro" (now playing; go see it!), we find ourselves facing the chill of a political regime selected by the puppet masters of the world stage. This stage had

been set some time ago and like trained circus canines all too many are falling into their supporting roles of being distracted by the rhetoric.

We've weathered many storms, keeping our heads above water, making our way as we could. With the Obama administration we glimpsed hope's rainbow. Now, however, the rough side of the mountain has come into full view. It doesn't seem to want to give us passage. By standing by in fear, we feed fear and the puppet masters' power. By spewing hate, we feed hate. By sitting around watching and reading media-spun discord, we become members in the band of thieves that seek to rob us of our very humanity. Where then do we go from here; past pain, past hope, past the past? I would be so bold as to point you toward an alternative, even in the midst of your wet lust affair with the drama.

Have you considered love? Not the sappy buttered-up sugar crusted pop film version, but a love that will tell us the freedom-road truth about ourselves. A love that will beat yo' ass to save you. A love that will not sit idly by and issue prayers to the devil known as complaints. A love that will get up and do, pull you up out of the pews and into the surrounding community. A love that will, by its divine nature, feed the giver and destroy anything that is against it. A love that will bring the fire next time.
