AAMU's 150th Campaign Surpasses \$4 Million in Gifts

Von Braun Center Celebrating 50th Anniversary

Over the course of 50 years, Huntsville's Von Braun Center has come to mean more than a favorite concert or an exciting game. At its downtown location, it's become the hub and heartbeat of Huntsville. "The Von Braun Center made us a

community," Mayor Tommy Battle said. "I don't think they build facilities like this anymore," added VBC executive director Steve Maples. "These days, the arena stands alone, and the convention center stands alone." In Huntsville,

though, it's all under one roof. It's all on one site. And on a busy day, up to a dozen different events will be happening at the VBC. City support has led to the facelift and expansion the VBC has undergone in recent years - including the opening

of Mars Music Hall and the VBC's first restaurant, Rhythm on Monroe, in 2020. No part of the VBC has gone untouched. Other support includes a \$380,000 upgrade to the steel rigging system at the Mark C. Smith Concert Hall to support large-scale

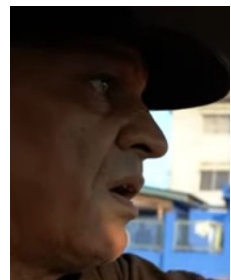

Valley Weekly Washington One Minute

Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington:

1. CONGRESS. The Senate and House are in session. Last week, House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) sent lawmakers home on Tuesday for the week after losing a procedural vote to quash a discharge petition by GOP Rep. Anna Paulina Luna (R-FL) that would allow proxy voting for new and expectant mothers and their spouses. This week, he will again attempt to suppress the Luna petition and then proceed with other bills, including one to halt nationwide injunctions by federal judges (an effort to preempt a more

aggressive GOP backbencher move to impeach U.S. District Judge James Boasberg, who has issued rulings that have provoked the President's ire regarding deportations and the recent Signal app scandal). Additional bills set for this week include legislation requiring voters to prove their U.S. citizenship before registering to vote in federal elections, as well as two resolutions aimed at overturning Biden-era regulations limiting bank overdraft fees and another regulating large nonbank companies offering digital wallets and payment apps. The House will also address the final version of the FY2025 Concurrent Budget

Resolution, which narrowly passed the Senate over the weekend by a vote of 51-48. The FY2025 Budget Resolution serves as the spending blueprint precursor to the Budget Reconciliation bill, which will be the vehicle for the main GOP agenda item in 2025 – the reauthorization of the 2017 tax cut law. GOP leadership plans to approve the Budget Resolution before the two-week Spring Recess that begins at the end of this week and then pass the full Reconciliation Bill before Memorial Day.

2. HIGHER EDUCATION. On April 4, House lawmakers introduced the bipartisan Tax-Free Pell Grant Act, with a Senate companion bill expected soon. Sponsored by members of the House Ways and Means Committee that will write significant tax legislation this year, the bill aims to exempt portions of Pell Grants used for non-tuition expenses (such as books and living

costs) from federal taxation. This measure would particularly benefit low-income community college students, making them eligible for the \$2,500 American Opportunity Tax Credit, from which they are largely excluded under current law. Community Colleges have strongly supported this legislation, helping to build momentum despite challenges related to tax revenue concerns.

3. SUPREME COURT. On last Friday, a divided Supreme Court voted 5-4 to allow the White House to freeze temporarily \$65 million in Department of Education grants that it claims promote diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), while litigation on the cancellation of these grants proceeds. In related federal grant news, The Washington Post reported on Sunday that the Agriculture Department (Ag) has told recipients of 3 stalled rural energy grant programs that Ag would begin disbursing the payments that had been suspended in January and encouraged the recipients to scrub their projects of any "DEI aspects" to receive payments sooner.

4. MARCH JOBS REPORT. The Labor Department reported on Friday that the U.S. economy added an unexpectedly strong 228,000

jobs in March, although the unemployment rate ticked up to 4.2% from February's 4.1% as job seekers lured by higher wages flooded into the labor market. Job growth was led by health care with 54,000 positions, reflecting increased demand from aging baby boomers; retailers with 24,000 jobs; and transportation/warehousing gaining 23,000 jobs as employers moved to stock up on goods ahead of the new tariffs.

5. EXECUTIVE BRANCH. On Monday, the President hosted a meeting with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the White House, as Israel deploys troops in a new security corridor across Gaza to pressure the Hamas militant group, and hosted the World Series champions Los Angeles Dodgers. Last Wednesday, invoking his authority under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act of 1977 (IEEPA), President Trump imposed a new 10% tariff on all countries that took effect April 5, 2025, at 12:01 a.m. EDT. He imposed an individualized reciprocal higher tariff on the countries with which the U.S. has the largest trade deficits that will take effect April 9, 2025, at 12:01 a.m. EDT. Exempt from the new tariffs are: (1) steel/aluminum articles and autos/auto parts already

subject to Section 232 (national security) tariffs; (2) copper, pharmaceuticals, semiconductors, and lumber articles; (3) bullion; and (4) energy and other minerals that are not available in U.S. These new tariffs do not apply to Mexico and Canada, which are on a separate tariff schedule, with non-USMCA compliant goods at 25% and non-USMCA compliant energy and potash at 10%. The New York Times published a chart showing tariffs with selected key trading partners (see below). Last Friday, the President extended the deadline on the TikTok video app for 75 days, after talks on a deal with TikTok's Chinese-based parent company ByteDance fell apart after the administration imposed a 34% tariff on Chinese goods on Wednesday. The TikTok ban had been set to take effect last Saturday. Also on Friday, the administration canceled a proposed Biden-era action to expand Medicare and Medicaid coverage for popular anti-obesity GLP-1 drugs, such as Ozempic, Wegovy, Rybelsus, and Mounjaro.

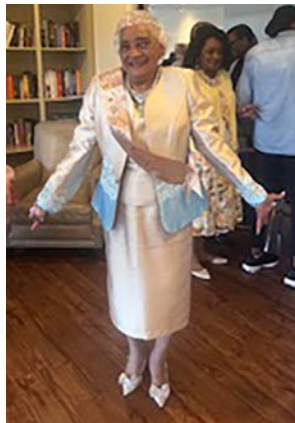

Executive Order #14248: "Election Security" - Really?

President Trump's Executive Order #14248 is a bold-faced voter suppression tactic disguised as "election security." By requiring documentary proof of citizenship—like a passport—to register and threatening to withhold federal funding from states that count mail-in ballots after Election Day, this order undermines the voting rights of millions of eligible Americans.

The ACLU rightfully labeled it a "**blatant overreach.**" It targets historically excluded communities—voters of color, naturalized citizens, the elderly, and disabled—placing unnecessary barriers between them and the ballot box.

But this isn't new. History has taught us that suppression often backfires.

Q: Where's Malcolm, Martin, Medger, Muhammad, or Marcus?

In **The Warmth of Other Suns**, Isabel Wilkerson documents how six million Black Americans fled the Jim Crow South from 1915 to 1970, in search of freedom. They didn't wait for a messianic figure like Dr. King or Malcolm X—they moved by the unseen hand of God and their own determination.



Today, we are that movement. **We are the leaders we've been waiting for.**

Before we point fingers at Trump's White House, let's reflect on our own: **over 90 million eligible voters sat out the 2024 election.** That's the same number as those who voted for the two leading candidates. Many felt disillusioned by the lack of clear choices—but apathy is not resistance. It's surrender.

Voter Suppression: Our Today's Grown-up Cookie Jar!

Voter participation isn't a cure-all, but it's vital. As the saying goes, "If you don't use it, you'll lose it."

And here's where Trump's plan will fail. According to the **Law of Unintended Consequences**, suppression often breeds motivation. Just ask the Pharaoh of Exodus: his plan to enslave Israelites led to their growth and eventual liberation. Or look at the **Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade** reversal—it sparked record voter registration among women.

Even children know the truth: tell us not to touch the cookie jar, and it's all we'll want.

So here's the message for the Trump-Musk administration: You will not win with EO #14248. Suppression won't silence us. It will only strengthen our resolve.

As Philippians 4:8 reminds us: "If there be any virtue... think on these things." Justice. Courage. Legacy. Let's think—and act—accordingly.

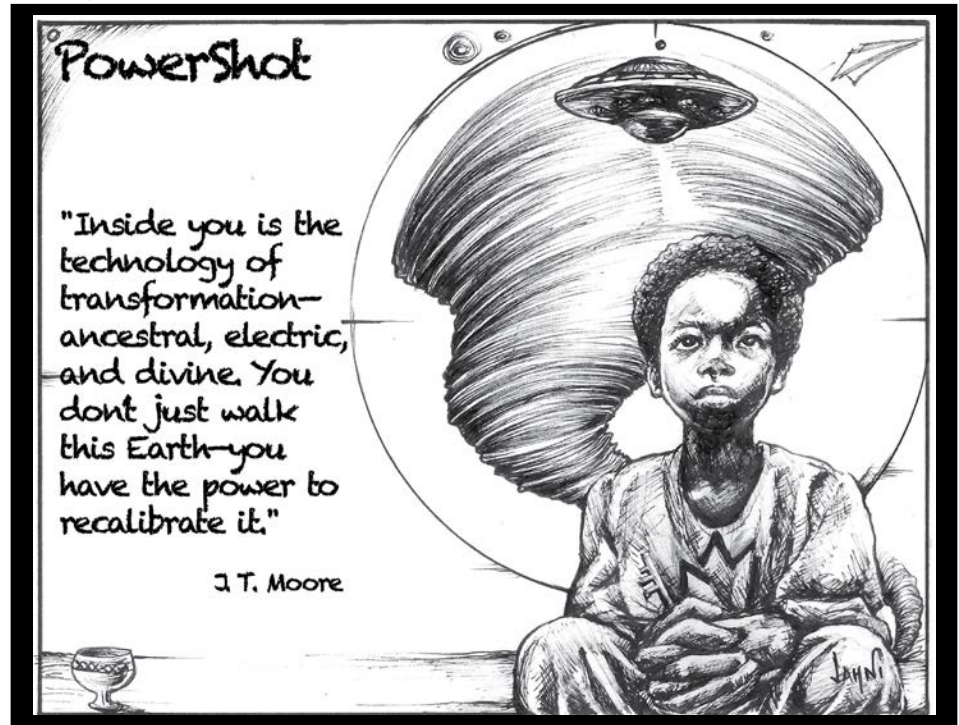

Dr. Daniel is a member of the Delta Theta Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., and he has been involved in numerous community and civic organizations.

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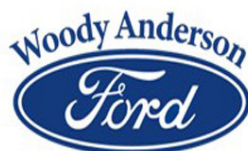


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
