TVW Senior Editor Pens "The Drake Song"

During the April 19 Kickoff Celebration for the 60th Anniversary of J.F. Drake Community and Technical College, President Patricia G. HHF Honors Noted Nurse

The Huntsville Hospital Foundation recently announced the establishment of a scholarship in memory of Daisy Pruitt Swinton, who served Huntsville Hospital patients for 40 years, working her way from housekeeping to ICU nurse manager.

Swinton was a trailblazer and the first African American to serve as an ICU nurse manager at Huntsville Hospital. Now, her legacy will support area students and health care workers who wish to pursue a nursing degree.

The official scholarship launch was held on what-would-have-been Mrs. Swinton's 83rd birthday, on April 14, 2021, at the Huntsville Hospital Plaza Resource Center. The program included a presentation of the commemorative portrait that will hang in the hospital's Intensive Care Unit.

The Daisy P. Swinton Scholarship opened for applications on Thursday, April 15. The event also served as the official launch



of Huntsville Hospital Foundation's 2021 Nurses Week campaign, where donations can be made in honor of local nurses benefiting the scholarship fund.

The Daisy P. Swinton Scholarship was initiated by her family and founded by Huntsville Hospital Foundation. It is fully funded by generous community donors.

The application is open to any employee of Huntsville Hospital or to outstanding high school or college students who have been accepted to a Nursing school or program.

Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. ON THE FLOOR. The House and Senate are in session this week. Among other items, the House will vote this week to make Washington, D.C., the 51st state (an identical bill passed the House last Congress but was not taken up by the Senate), debate a bill rejecting the previous Administration's policy of banning arrivals from predominantly Muslim countries, and a bill to reaffirm immigrants' right to counsel during status hearings.

The Senate will resume consideration of the Covid-hate crimes legislation and will also vote on more Biden Administration sub-Cabinet nominees. Senators received a briefing from the Biden Administration on Tuesday regarding the President's announcement last week to remove all 3,500 U.S. troops from Afghanistan by Sep-

tember 11, 2021. The House GOP will hold a retreat this weekend in Orlando, Fla.

2. BIDEN 100 DAYS. On Monday, President Biden met with a bipartisan group from the House and Senate on his infrastructure plan. On Tuesday, he met with members of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus. On Thursday and Friday, the President hosted a virtual international climate summit with 40 world leaders and Politico reported that the Biden administration is assembling a "Climate-Related Financial Risk" executive order ahead of the summit, which will direct White House economic and climate advisers to work with OMB on a government-wide strategy to measure, mitigate and disclose climate risks facing federal agencies.

Banking, housing and agriculture regulators are among those that will be asked to incorporate climate risk into their supervision of major industries and the lending of federal funds. Last Saturday night, the White House announced that Special Presidential Envoy for Climate John Kerry

had reached an agreement with China that the two countries would develop long-term strategies this year to reach carbon neutrality.

President Biden will address Congress on April 28 to mark his first 100 days in office. White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki announced last week that South Korean President Moon Jae-In will visit the White House in May (note: President Biden met with Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga on Friday at the White House).

3. VOTING RIGHTS. On Tuesday at 10 a.m., the Senate Judiciary Committee held a hearing on voter suppression laws being debated in state legislatures entitled, "Jim Crow 2021: the Latest Assault on the Right to Vote." The hearing witnesses will include Senator Raphael Warnock (D-GA) and 2018 Georgia gubernatorial candidate Stacey Abrams.

4. PROJECT EARMARKS. According to Fox News, Senate Republicans met this Wednesday (April 21) to debate allowing GOP Senators to request congressionally-added project earmarks, which have been banned since

2011. The House GOP caucus voted in a secret ballot to allow its Members to request earmarks on March 17 and both House and Senate Democrats are already moving forward with earmark requests, now known as "community project funding."

5. SENATE WORKFORCE HEARING. On April 20 at 10 a.m., the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee held a hearing entitled "COVID-19 Recovery: Supporting

Workers and Modernizing the Workforce Through Quality Education, Training and Employment Opportunities." Dr. Scott Ralls, president of Wake Technical Community College in N.C., will serve as a witness.



D6 Commissioner Calls Vaccination Clinic Successful

The pop-up clinic was a partnership between the District 6 office and Huntsville Hospital, and it served

approximately 200 people.

The District 6 COVID-19 Initiative focuses on three central tenants: safety, education, and COVID-19 relief. Commissioner Edwards has prioritized the safety of her constituents during this pandemic, and this clinic is her most recent commit-

ment to the fight against the virus.

This is the second partnership between the District 6 and Huntsville Hospital. In January, Huntsville Hospital, along with Thrive Alabama, provided COVID-19 testing.



As married women assume top leadership positions increasingly, Prince Philip's silver-mettle leadership role served as the OG (Original Gangster) for husbands to "stand by your woman."

Martin Palmer noted that his friend Philip "wore the trousers so that she could wear the Crown."

Philip: "When the Queen succeeded we sort of chatted about who would do what and I thought that if I could relieve her of the management of the estates it would save her a lot of time." It worked.

With her husband of 73 years two paces behind her, Queen Elizabeth's 69-year monarchy ranks her as world history's longest-serving female head of state, oldest living monarch, longest-reigning current monarch, and oldest and longest-serving current head of state. To support her, Emhoff closed his California law practice, and now teaches a Georgetown Law School entertainment law class.


Our Growing Treasure in Heaven

Minister LaVern Spearman has served the scouting community in various capacities for more than 30 years. For the past 30 years he has served as Scoutmaster (SM) of Troop 102, sponsored by First Missionary Baptist Church, Blue Springs Road, Huntsville, Ala.

Over 75 Scouts have earned Boy Scouts of America's highest achievement award, the rank of Eagle Scout, under his tenure. Over the years and along with other scout leaders, SM Spearman has seen over 6,000 scouts across Madison County and the surrounding Huntsville area become physically strong, morally straight and mentally awake.

He has served in various roles in the church as Deacon, Minister of Church School Education, and as teacher of various Church school classes. He is the president and founder of Body of Christ Ministries, which is a ministry designed to encourage men and women to take their rightful and God-given places in the church, family and workplace. This ministry orchestrates trips to

various Christian retreats, conferences and spiritual outreaches. He teaches an inner-city Monday Night Bible Study to men and women across social, racial and denominational lines. He works with the Neaves-Davis Youth Detention Center to deter all youth from becoming a statistic in the criminal justice system and to show them that "you cannot walk with God and run with the Devil."

Before his retirement in 2012, he taught and shared in a weekly mid-day lunch Bible class with men and women at Redstone Arsenal for over 15 years. In addition, he works extensively with the Kairos Prison Ministry International in strengthening the spiritual lives of prisoners in Limestone and other surrounding counties. He also serves with the Alabama Walk to Emmaus Community to inspire, challenge, and equip leaders for Christian action in their homes, places of work, and in their local churches and communities and has served as Lay Director of the Huntsville Emmaus Cluster.



Minister Spearman is a Board member of Marketplace Leadership Luncheon ministry with a primary mission of empowering the business community to recognize and fulfill their calling in the workplace, building God's Kingdom, impacting lives, and transforming communities through biblical principles in understanding the divine purpose for their lives.
