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Here are the top issues and events in Washington for the week of April 29.

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The Senate is expected to turn to the bill reauthorizing the Federal Aviation Administration, on which Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) filed cloture last Tuesday (although the 4 Democratic senators from MD and VA have pledged to oppose if a provision adding 10 new slots at Reagan Airport are not removed from the bill). The current FAA authorization extension expires on May 10. The House will take up a long list of bills, including a bill to reverse prohibitions on oil and gas development in the 13-million-acre Alaska National Petroleum Reserve and a bill to require the Department of Education to use a broader definition of antisemitism when enforcing federal anti-discrimination laws (in

to only 6 Americans). 2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Sunday, President Biden spoke with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to reaffirm his strong opposition to any Israeli military operation in Rafah. On Tuesday, he attended a campaign event in Wilmington, DE and on Wednesday a campaign event in D.C. On Friday, the President will present the Presidential Medal of Freedom to individuals who have made exemplary contributions to the country. Last Thursday, the Biden Administration released a new regulation that will require new natural gas power plants to either cut or capture 90% of their climate pollution by 2032. Existing coal generators scheduled to run past 2032 also will have to

slash emissions, and fossil fuel plants that aren't retrofitted with pollution controls must exit the grid by 2039. The rules are expected to reduce the carbon dioxide emissions from the sector by 75% compared to its peak in 2005.

3. SUPREME COURT. The Court on Monday was scheduled to issue orders (i.e, orders granting or denying review on the merits in a particular case), as well as issue opinions on cases argued this term.

4. FEDERAL RESERVE. The Fed's Federal Open Market Committee met on Tuesday and Wednesday to discuss interest rates, although no rate cut is now expected at this meeting. Last Thursday, the Commerce Department announced that real gross domestic product (GDP) increased at an annual rate of 1.6% in the first quarter of 2024, down from last quarter's 3.4% (and below economists' expected 2.4%). Consumer spending increased 2.5% in the period, down from a 3.3% gain in the

fourth quarter and below the 3% Wall Street estimate. The same report showed that the Fed's primary inflation gauge, the core personal consumption expenditures (PCE) price index, rose at a 3.7% annual rate in Q1, above 3.4% expectations.

5. BAN ON NON-COM-PETES. Last Tuesday, the Federal Trade Commission issued a final rule banning noncompete clauses nationwide, affecting 30 million workers in the U.S. Under the new rule, existing non-competes for the vast majority of workers will no longer be enforceable after the rule's effective date (120 days from publication in the Federal Register). Existing non-competes for senior executives - who represent less than 0.75% of workers - can remain in force under the FTC's final rule, but employers are banned from entering into or attempting to enforce any new non-competes, even if they involve senior executives. Employers will be required

to provide notice to workers other than senior executives who are bound by an existing non-compete that they will not be enforcing any noncompetes against them.

6. EDUCATION AND LABOR. On Tuesday, April 30, **Education Secretary Miguel** Cardona provided a review of the President's Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Request for the Department of Education to the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies. On May 1, the full House Committee on Education and the Workforce held a hearing to examine the policies and priorities of the U.S. Department of Labor that Acting Secretary Julie Su will present.

see any time we begin to participate in the act of lying then we are of the devil (John 8:44).



AAMU Will Help State with Economic Growth Plan

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey has announced Alabama A&M University has been selected to assist in the creation of a new strategic economic growth plan that will guide the state into the next decade and beyond.

A&M researchers will gather comprehensive data to help a small team led by Ellen McNair, secretary of the Alabama Department of Commerce, to identify the plan's overall objectives, potential new approaches and the target industry sectors best aligned for recruitment and growth.

Collaborating partners include: 1) McKinsey & Company, which will conduct a quantitative analysis of the target sectors and develop strategies for each of these sectors spanning the range of innovation and entrepreneurship, business retention/expansion and business attraction. The firm will also engage with industry leaders outside of Alabama for a qualitative analysis; 2) Troy University's Continuing Education and Outreach will facilitate focus groups of internal stakeholders including regional economic developers, private sector leaders and business associations:



and 3) AAMU's Center for Educator Preparation and Certification Services

will bring an academic element to the qualitative analysis through extensive notetaking, review and the preparation of a final report based on the information gathered.

"The AAMU Research Team is looking forward to the partnership with Troy University to analyze the data to develop a report for creating the strategic economic plan for Alabama," says Dr. Lydia Davenport, Lead Researcher for the Project and Director for the Center for Education Preparation and Certification Services.

The AAMU Research Team also includes Dr. Takisha Durm, Assistant Professor of Elementary Education; Dr. Salam Khan, Professor of Mathematics, and Dr. John Prestridge, Assistant Professor of Instructional Leadership.

The A&M researchers say the data analysis coupled with the writing of the final report will be critical to state lawmakers as they make decisions based on the evidence they will provide.

In addition, the executive committee will continue a partnership with the Hoover Institution, a leading economic policy research center led by former U.S. Secretary of State and Alabama native Condoleeza Rice, which has been analyzing many aspects of the state's economic development practices and strategies.

tial, office space and retail offerings into the downtown district in the old site of the Coca-Cola bottling plant.

The development site spans over 11 acres and features 545 residential units, 36,000 sq. ft. of Class-A office space and 47,000 sq. ft. of retail space. A public urban green space with

public art will be located between two six-story buildings that will make up the development's first phase. Retail space is expected to be available in late 2025 with apartments following in early 2026.

The development also has a second phase with hotel, office high-rise, condos and more.

"This is an extraordinary project that will make downtown Huntsville even more attractive to both residents and visitors," said Shane Davis, the City's Director of Urban and Economic Development. "We are grateful for the work by the developers to help bring this project to the start of construction."





A&M Fellows Go to the Netherlands

Four Alabama A&M University students participated in Stanford University's Hasso Plattner Institute of Design (d.school) at the University of Twente in Enschede, Netherlands, April 9-15. The students were among 242 students from 63 higher education students in 15 countries named University Innovation Fellows.

The University Innovation Fellows (UIF) program empowers students to become agents of change at their schools. Fellows work to ensure that all students gain the attitudes, skills and knowledge required to navigate a complex world and build the future.
