Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week: 1. The House and Senate are in session this week. Last Wednesday, Senate Democrats filed a petition to force a vote this week to restore the FCC's net neutrality rule (requiring internet service providers to treat all data equally), a repeal of which imposed by the Trump Administration is set to take effect on June 11. According to Huffington Post, Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME) is expected to vote with the Democrats,

which would give them a 50-49 win (Sen. McCain is absent). The House will take up a reauthorization of the Farm Bill, which includes controversial provisions to impose stricter work requirements on food stamp recipients and shift billions of dollars to state training programs. The House may also take up a resolution to approve President Trump's proposed impound of \$15.4 billion in federal spending, including \$7 billion from the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

2. The House Appropriations Committee will continue this week to move the FY2019 appropriations bills with the hope of restoring regular order for the FY2019 cycle. This week, subcommittees marked up the FY19 Interior Appropriations bill and the FY19 Transportation/HUD Appropriations bill. The full committee also marked up the FY19 Agriculture and Energy & Water Appropriations bills.

3. President Trump cancelled a planned trip to Texas for a GOP fundraiser. White House staffers Ivanka Trump and Jared Kushner are in Israel today to attend the opening of the new U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem.

4. Starting this week, the Supreme Court began issuing the final decisions of its 2017-2018 term, including Gill v. Whitford (partisan gerrymandering in Wisconsin); Masterpiece Cakeshop v. The Colorado Civil Rights Commission (the gay wedding cake case); and National Institute of Family and Life Advocates v. Becerra (on the notice required at California pregnancy centers re: the availability of free or low-cost abortions).

5. May 17 was the deadline for the Trump Administration to submit a final NAFTA renegotiation deal to Congress if it wanted Congress to approve the deal this year under the fast-track procedures, which allow for an up-or-down vote without amendment. Fast-track requires a 90-day notice to Congress before the President can sign the renegotiated NAFTA agreement. Negotiators from the U.S., Canada, and Mexico have been meeting for the last 9 months but are reportedly deadlocked over the U.S. plan to increase to 75% from 62.5% the portion of

duty-free autos using North American parts and to require 40% of the work by workers making at least \$16 per hour.

6. This week, Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao and EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt travelled to California to meet with state officials to discuss maintaining a single standard for fuel economy rules for cars and light trucks, in view of the Trump Administration's plan to freeze the standards at 2020 levels for the next 5 years - at about 30 mpg – instead if going up to 36 mpg by 2025 as required by a 2012 Obamaera rulemaking. According to the Associated Press, if California were to impose its own stricter requirement, it would likely be joined by other 12 states that make up 40% of U.S. new-vehicle sales.

7. The Trump administration announced a new policy that tightens enforcement of visa overstays for foreign students and exchange visitors. The policy, which applies to F, J and M visas, will change the way U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services calculates "unlawful presence" - time spent in the U.S. after legal status ends. Beginning Aug. 9, the agency will count unlawful presence from the date the student's visa expires. A person who accrues unlawful presence can be barred from the U.S. for years, or even permanently.

AAMU Basketball Coach Resigns

Alabama A&M University announced last week that it had accepted the resignation of head men's basketball coach Donnie Marsh and that a search for a new coach is underway.

When Marsh was announced as head men's basketball coach on April 12 last year, AAMU Athletics Director Bryan Hicks proclaimed "a new era of Bulldogs basketball."

Marsh had served as the associate head coach at

Texas Southern University in Houston for two seasons prior to joining AAMU. He had served as an assistant coach for 13 years with stints at Indiana (2004-06), University of Alabama-Birmingham (2006-12), South Florida (2013-15) and Texas Southern (2015-17).

Marsh's career as an assistant coach also includes stops at Virginia Tech (1997-2000) and Florida State (1995-97). He was

national from 2000-04. A 1979 graduate of Franklin &

Marshall College in Pennsylvania with a bachelor's degree in history and education, Marsh earned All-American honors and helped the Diplomats to a 27-5 record.
