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

Servant Leader Steph Curry wins NBA's top Servant Leadership Award - Again!


"I know your works, your labor, your patience, . . ." - Revelation 2:2-4

For the second time the Professional Basketball Writers Association, a respected authority in the field, has chosen to honor the Golden State Warriors' Steph Curry with the 2024 Magic Johnson Award. [Warriors star Stephen Curry wins the second Magic Johnson Award -

ESPN.]

This annual accolade celebrates current players who, like the legendary Magic Johnson, embody servant leader-

ship both on and off the court, as demonstrated through their interactions with fans and the media.



While sports media chronicles the heroics of super athletes daily, they rarely, if ever, showcase these megastars as servant leaders—that is, until my latest best-selling book, Where Jump Shots Meet Jesus.

Here, I take an unorthodox approach to servant leadership by examining winning NBA championship dynasties and their top servant leaders.

Such dynasties have been led by servant leaders who mimicked Jesus Christ's mantra paraphrased in Matthew 20:28, "I came to serve, not to be served."

The influence of servant leadership on NBA championship dynasties is undeniable. The Celtics led by Bill Russell, Magic's Lakers, Scottie Pippen's Chicago Bulls, Kobe's Lakers, and Steph's Warriors all achieved dynasties under the guidance of servant leaders. These leaders, in the spirit of Jesus Christ's teachings, prioritized serving their teammates over personal glory, leading to multiple NBA titles. Curry represents the latest example.

"The Curry Chronicle"

Curry has been rewarded for such sacrifices. His 15-year career features two league MVPs, four NBA championships, 10 All-Star appearances, four All-NBA first-team selections, and the league's 75th Anniversary Team membership; more recently, Curry won the 2022-23 J. Walter Kennedy Citizenship Award and the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Trophy, the latter as the league's Social Justice Champion.

Parents: if not doing so already, begin creating "homemade Stephs (servant leaders)" eligible to receive awards honoring "Magics" (forerunning servant leaders). Teach them to serve first, instead of being served first - just like Jesus.

If God put it into motion, allow Him to fight the battles of the naysayers for you. What do you think Noah, David, or Nehemiah would have accomplished if they were listening to what others had to say about their assignments?

Mrs. Ida Belle Henderson Crawford is an Alabama native, who at six years old entered the public schools and graduated with a high school diploma in 1961. In the fall of that year, she began her freshman year at Alabama A&M College. In May 1965, Crawford received a bachelor's degree in history and social science. Two weeks before graduation, she received a letter from the Superintendent of Shelby County Schools Board of Education. She scheduled an interview and was hired to teach at Calera Elementary School in August. During the following summer, she begin taking classes in Library Science at the University of Alabama in Birmingham. In September, when she returned to Calera Elementary School, she was informed that her name had been placed on the teacher exchange list.

During the 1960s, many schools in the South fell under the mandatory integration initiative. In December, Crawford was sent to teach at Calera High School, along with three other teachers. The school was classified as a unit school -1st through 12th grade. She remained at Calera High as the librarian until she relocated to Huntsville, Ala., in 1970.

During that summer, she enrolled in Alabama

A&M University's School of Library Media, and was also employed by Madison County Schools as the librarian for Owens Crossroads Elementary School. In the summer of 1973, she received a M.S. degree in library media and the following year was employed by the Huntsville City Schools ation as a Librarian for Lee High School. Throughout her 25 years at Lee High School, she sponsored school clubs such as: The Junior Civitan Club (Kiwanis), The Student Council, and Boys and Girls Social Clubs. She served on the Huntsville School Policy and Committee, The Alabama Accreditation Team for Schools and Libraries, and the Alabama Review for Library Standards in Alabama.

She also was employed by a contractor to coordinate the Summer High School Apprenticeship Research Program (SHARP) at NASA'S George C. Marshall Space Flight Center. Rising high school seniors were selected to research, write and present a report on their mentor's projector in a field of engineering, science, computer, or geography. She retired in 2002.

Crawford and her family are members of Lakeside United Methodist Church, where she participated in the choir and Sunday School, served one term as



Admirative Board Chair and president of the United Methodist Women, and on many programs. In 1964, while a student at AAMU. she became a member of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. She served as president of Sigma Beta Chapter and the Pan-Hellenic Council. She has served on the national level as coordinator of Zeta Challenger Kids Program. Youth were sent to the Space and Rocket Centers. She served two terms as the South Central Region Parliamentarian, chaired the Alabama State Executive Board, chaired the Scholarship Committee, and served as Historian.

She is married to Lambert Crawford, and they have two adult children: Linda Crawford-Gamble, D.M.D. (Tony), and Lambert Milo Crawford (Daria). She has four grandchildren: Mylan, Lemuel, Keiren and Hailey (deceased).


