AAMU Loses Longtime Philanthropist, Alum

The Alabama **A&M** University community is saddened by the recent death of Dr. Ermest L. Knight, a 1953 alum who was a standout contributor to the University for some 60 years.

A native of Evergreen, Ala., Knight's first job was as a

biology teacher in his native rural Conecuh County. Throughout the years that followed, Dr. Knight became a professor and department head for decades in the City University of New York (CUNY) system.

The longtime

New York City resident attended the Magic City Classic religiously, and his incessant contributions to his alma mater ultimately led to the naming of the mammoth five-story Ernest L. Knight Student Living-Learning Center in his honor.

Washingt One Minui

Here are the top issues and events in Washington for the week of May 27.

- 1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in recess this week and will reconvene next week. Last week, the Senate confirmed President Biden's 200th and 201st judicial nominees (note: former President Trump appointed 237 judges, including 3 to the Supreme Court). House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) announced last week that Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu will address a Joint Meeting of Congress at a TBD date in the near future.
- 2. THE WHITE HOUSE. On Monday, the President participated in a wreathlaying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Ceremony and, on Wednesday, he traveled to Philadelphia for a campaign event. On Friday, he will host the Kansas City Chiefs at the White House to celebrate their Super Bowl victory.
- 3. SUPREME COURT. Last Thursday in a 6-3 decision, the Supreme Court upheld a redistricting map drawn by the GOP-dominated South Carolina legislature, throwing out a ruling by a federal district court that a congressional district on the South Carolina coast was an unconstitutional racial gerrymander. Writing for the court's six conservatives, Justice Samuel Alito said that the South Carolina map was a partisan gerrymander, which is legal, not a racial gerrymander, which would

be illegal under the Constitution. Therefore, the disputed district will remain a safe seat for Republicans, who hold a 6-1 advantage in the state's congressional delegation. More opinions from this term are expected from the court this week.

4. EDUCATION. On May 24, the U.S. Department of Education announced it had processed more than 10 million 2024-25 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA*) forms. Since rolling out the Better FAFSA form, the Department has made progress to address known issues with the form. Students who complete a Better FAFSA online at this point can expect their records to be sent to colleges within one to three days. According to the latest data, nearly 90% of nonprofit and four-year institutions are packaging and sending out aid offers to students. A surge in FAFSA submissions in recent weeks has closed the gap from nearly 40 percent just two months ago to 12 percent today. This gap continues to fall. To encourage Better FAFSA submissions, the Department developed the FAFSA Support Strategy, now with two distinct arms, supporting institutions of higher education and students and families across K-12 and higher education.


Drama and Theatre Arts degree program.



Samuel Alito: become "ExcuseLess"!

"Be sure your sins will find you out." - Numbers 32:23.

On May 17, The New York Times revealed that Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito's home displayed an upside-down American flag that January 6th insurrectionists brandished when invading the US Capitol building in 2021, trying to reverse Biden's 2020 election.

According to the U.S. flag code, an American flag flown upside down symbolizes "a signal of dire distress in instance of extreme danger to life or property."

As justices are to be apolitical, the call for Justice Alito's recusal from Trump-related cases grows louder, from many Democrats and social activists.

In the face of the protest, he ducked responsibility and blamed his wife, <u>Justice</u> Alito responds to upside-down US flag on his front lawn, as Alito's "excuse" for the

upside-down flag displayed at their home for several days following the 2021 insurrection. Really?

Rather than passing the buck, he'd be better served by reading Debleaire Snell's just-released book ExcuseLess: Canceling The Excuses That Smother Soul Wellness.

This book is not just a guide but a catalyst for personal growth and development, offering a path to a life free from excuses.

Its principles could help Alito navigate the current situation with the upside-down flag and the growing calls for your recusal.

In this 156-page print and audiobook, Snell likens excusemaking to kryptonite, the enemy of Superman.

Maybe excuse-making is Alito's kryptonite. What's yours? Difficulties of themselves are not your kryptonite, Snell offered. "Your kryptonite is the excuses in your life that often flow from difficulties. No situation can permanently weaken or derail you. The promise of Romans 8:28 says: 'All things work together for good to them who love the Lord and are called according to his purpose."

The author notes on the back cover, "This book has been written with the clear aim for showing you how to cancel the excuses that are smothering your soul wellness. . . . work harder, get organized, and wake up earlier . . . are only symptoms of a larger issue. . . . the root are the excuses and false narratives that we tell ourselves. If we desire to see permanent life change, it is the result of living a life that is excuseless."

Man up, Alito, fellow head of household. Such excuse-making will weaken and "krypton-ize" us from ever becoming "more powerful than a locomotive."

Officials Cut Ribbon to New City Hall

Huntsville City leaders lauded the new City Hall as a 100-year building designed to be more accommodating during a May 21 ribbon-cutting celebration near the main entrance.

Located at 305 Fountain Circle, Huntsville's new center of municipal government will bring departments that frequently interact with the public under one roof to provide efficient services for residents and businesspeople who previously had to visit multiple locations to conduct business with the City.

Mayor Tommy Battle told Huntsvillians gathered that the new facility "will last us for the next 100 years," according to Huntsvilleal.gov.

Through a collaboration with ArtsHuntsville, nine pieces of public art are displayed throughout



the seven-floor building to enhance the community's cultural experience.

Each piece, through the artist's interpretation, tells Huntsville's story and spotlights characteristics that make the city unique, officials report.

Following the ribboncutting ceremony, the City hosted an open house for attendees to explore the building and enjoy the art pieces.

The occasion marks the culmination of a two-year construction project that formally began with a

groundbreaking ceremony on April 11, 2022.

Mayor Battle announced that day that the former City Hall at 308 Fountain Circle would be razed, and the site added to Big Spring Park.

Through the design by architects Goodwyn Mills Cawood, the new City Hall enhances efficiency by consolidating City departments that had been working in seven different locations throughout the city.





Mrs. Ruby Jones Dickson was born in Texarkana, Texas, on March 31, 1943, to the Reverend Elmer and Mrs. Nellie Jones. She attended New Town Elementary School and graduated from Paul Laurence Dunbar High School of Texarkana, Texas. She became a Christian at an early age and united with Red Springs Baptist Church.

After relocating to the New Town community, she became a member of the New Town Baptist Church. She married the late Edward Ford in 1963, and to this union four children were born: Bridgette Ford May, Edward (Jerry) Ford Jr., Stephanie Ford Shanks, and Byron Ford.

From 1968-1972, she traveled as a military wife. During her travels, she sang with the K-Town (Kaiserslautern) Gospel Singers, which led her twice to (NATO) Belgium, a vast part of Germany, and one appearance on German television.

In 1972, she relocated from Oakland, Calif., (via Texarkana, Texas) to Colorado Springs, Colo. There she became a member of the New Jerusalem Baptist Church and worked with the Mission, Sunday School, choir and sang with a gospel group (The Jubiletts). She was employed and retired at Hewlett-Packard.

Dickson was inspired to write a meaningful and memorable poem for her mother's retirement. This would be the beginning of her pursuit to become a

God-given gift as a Christian poet. In 1988, it was in the divine plan of God that she would return to her home in Texarkana, Texas. She became an active member of Macedonia Baptist Church. She worked with the B.M. & E. State Convention of Texas Women's Auxiliary. It was in Texarkana that

she wrote and self-published her first three books: "The Holy Spirit Speaks," "O Taste And See," and "Think On These Things." She attended a Christian workshop at the Mount Orange Baptist Church in Texarkana, Texas. The facilitator was from the Sunday School Publishing Board in Nashville Tenn. She asked him to look at the three books. He was very impressed and asked her to send them to Nashville as soon as possible. In December 1998 at the Winter Board in Nashville, Tenn., her first book signing was held.

In 1994, she married the late Reverend Russell Dickson, pastor of the Unity Baptist Church, where she taught Sunday School and the Mission. It would be two years later that she would publish her last book "The Suffering Servant.' In 2000, she relocated to Huntsville, Ala., and united with the St. Luke Christian Church, under the leadership of Reverend T.C. Johnson. At St. Luke, she taught the new members class on church membership, facilitated women's ministries and programs, and served as ward leader for 20 families in the



congregation.

She worked in Exodus, lnc., as an administrative assistant and teacher assistant in the computer lab. She attended Calhoun Community College, earning an AA in general education. She was inducted into the National Honor Society, was on the Dean's list, was noted in "Who's Who in Junior Colleges of America," was nominated among the top 10 students of Calhoun and graduated Magna Cum Laude. She attended Athens State University to pursue a bachelor's degree in religious studies and a minor in Christian education.

She is an author published by Townsend Press with four completed works of poetry: "The Holy Spirit Speaks," "O Taste and See," "Think on These Things" and "The Suffering Servant." She now works as a volunteer with the Broken Arrow Ministries, feeding the homeless in Huntsville, Ala.




