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Here are the top issues and events in Washington for the week. All federal government offices will be closed on Wednesday in observance of Juneteenth.

1. CONGRESS. The Senate is in session this week and the House is in recess. Last week, the House narrowly approved the \$883.7 billion Defense Authorization bill on a 217-199 vote providing a 19.5% pay raise for junior enlisted troops, but also containing amendments curbing funding for abortion, transgender medical care, and diversity efforts - all of which are destined to be non-starters in the Senate. House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) traveled to Florida Monday to meet with former President Trump at Mar-a-Lago. The Senate starts off the week with a judicial nominee vote and is also expected to take up a bill reauthorizing firefighter grant programs (AFG and SAFER grants)...

2. THE WHITE HOUSE. The Biden-Harris campaign said it had raised \$30 million on Saturday night in Los Angeles. Former President Obama joined Monday. The President met with NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg at the White House, and on Tuesday he hosted an event marking the 12th anniversary of the DACA Program. 3. SUPREME COURT. Last Friday, the Supreme Court in a 6-3 ruling struck down a Trump-era regulation banning bump stocks promulgated by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives after a 2017 mass shooting at the Route 91 Harvest music festival in Las Vegas, where a shooter used the device in killing 60 people and injuring 500. Earlier last week, the Court

unanimously threw out a lawsuit seeking to roll back access to mifepristone, one of the 2 drugs used in medication abortions, ruling that the doctors and medical groups challenging the expansion of access to the drug by the Food and Drug Administration in 2016 and 2021 lacked standing to sue. The Court also sided with Starbucks in a labor dispute last week in an 8-1 decision that will make it harder for the National Labor Relations Board to challenge unfair labor practices. 4. EDUCATION/WORKFORCE. Last week, the House Rules Committee approved the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) and excluded the Bipartisan Workforce Pell Act (BPWA) as an amendment. As AACC's Rep. Elise Stefanik (R-NY) and Rep. Bobby Scott (D-VA) offered the BPWA as an amendment to NDAA last week. The NDAA, which is a "must-pass bill," usually garners hundreds of potential amendments. Most educationrelated amendments are typically stripped from NDAA as not germane. As a result, the BWPA amendment was a long shot, and it also faced opposition from the American Council on Education (ACE) and others who objected to the bill's offset. Advocates will continue working with policymakers to find a viable legislative vehicle for legislation to expand Pell Grant eligibility to students in short-term workforce programs.

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Olympic Team USA Snub Showcases Rookie Caitlin Clark's Veteran Maturity

Have you ever been disappointed when you didn't receive a slam-dunk "sure thing"? Here's how to handle it like a "veteran," as in rookie Caitlin Clark.

The "Caitlin Clark Effect"

Get used to hearing and seeing that name as the face of today's women's basketball. In April, this two-time national collegiate women's player of the year became the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) number 1 draft pick and signed with its Indiana Fever franchise. She was named the WNBA's Rookie of the Month for May and currently leads all rookies in points (16.8) and assists (6.3) per game.

Across the league, arena attendance and TV viewerships have increased, and the "Caitlin Clark Effect" is dubbed.

... And the Caitlin Clark "Snub"

Yet on June 9, Team USA's selection committee announced that she was not included on its Summer Paris Olympics roster. The committee cited its historic leaning toward selecting a more veteran roster.

While several sports media pundits criticized Team USA's snub, not so for Ms. Clark. Instead, she supported the decision and even saw it as a motivation.

Now, the Rookie Clark's "Veteran" Response

"Honestly, I'm not disappointed. It just gives me something to work for; it's a dream," she said. "Hopefully, one day, I can be there. I think it's just a little more motivation. You remember that. Hopefully, when four years come back around (the 2028 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles), I can be there.

"But then additionally, it's a great opportunity for us (the 3-9 Fever) to work and get better—a great opportunity for myself to get in the weight room. To work on the court, at things that I want to get better at that I maybe didn't have time [to] going from college to the pro season.

"So I'm looking forward to it. But at the same time, we still have a month of games [ahead] where we have a lot of opportunities to win a lot of games. That's where my main focus is."

Valley Weekly **Produce Prescriptions a Potential Change to Community Health**

(BPT) - "Let food be thy medicine and medicine be thy food." "An apple a day keeps the doctor away."

Whether a quote often attributed to Greek physician Hippocrates or a rhyme many of us learned in our youth, the connection between the foods we eat and their effects on our physical health has always been generally understood but not necessarily followed.

In recent years, this disconnect has resulted in dramatically increased rates of diet-related diseases, including obesity and diabetes. Driving both conditions is poor diet, which annually contributed to more than 14.1 million cases of type 2 diabetes alone.

These diseases burden our healthcare system, where 8 out of 10 healthProduce Rx, have been introduced to some health care providers and the communities they serve.

People who care about their health have wanted to know - what is a produce prescription?

A patient gets an actual prescription from their doctor for a fruit and

vegetable benefit on a card or voucher that can be redeemed at a participating grocery store. This benefit is typically refillable monthly and is covered by health insurance at no or low cost to the patient. Currently there are 250 produce prescription programs operating in 38 states.

More than 150 million Americans are covered by federal insurance programs and if embedded as a covered benefit into the federal health system, produce prescriptions could reach millions of eligible Americans.

While some critics say produce prescriptions are merely a passing trend, data exists that show Produce Rx is both economically feasible and effective, as well as much more natural than a traditional prescription from a doctor.

Tufts University found produce prescriptions for 40- to 79-year-olds facing diabetes could prevent 296,000 cases of cardiovascular disease over their lifetimes.

Another study found that produce prescription program participants consumed more fruits and vegetables and reduced food insecurity. They also self-reported health status among both adults and children and found the program resulted in a wide array of improvements across several metabolic health markers, boosting long-term health.

From a community perspective, a nonprofit in North Carolina took a \$500,000 produce prescription grant and turned it into \$8 million in redemption of fruits and vegetables in a little over a year. Lower-income consumers in the impacted market are now doubling their spend on fruits and vegetables.

The International Fresh Produce Association, a global organization leading the fresh fruit and vegetable industry, is working to scale produce prescriptions on several fronts.

As part of IFPA's work to support the U.S. National Strategy on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health, the association developed a video distributed to medical schools and more than 5 million student/medical professionals worldwide to help them understand how they can prescribe fruits and vegetables to their patients (in addition to any medications needed) to manage symptoms of chronic disease.

Produce prescription programs hold great promise to help more consumers eat more fresh fruits and vegetables to optimize their health and enjoy lives filled with vitality and vibrancy. Images: DALL-E/Saintjones
