



Washington in One Minute



Here are the happenings in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. **ON THE FLOOR.** The House and Senate are in session this week. The House will take up 2 abortion-related bills: the first to legalize abortion services nationwide and the second to protect the right of women to cross state lines to seek abortion services. The House will also take up its \$850 billion Defense Authorization bill. The Senate this week will try to advance the nomination of Ohioan Steven Dettelbach to be Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), who has been closely questioned on his views on reinstating the assault weapons ban. The ATF has been without a Senate-confirmed director since 2015 (in September 2021 the White House withdrew the previous nomination of David Chipman); however, voting may be delayed because Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer tested positive for Covid over the weekend and will be absent from the Senate this week.

2. **THE WHITE HOUSE.** Last Friday, President Biden issued an executive order creating a cabinet-level Interagency Task Force on Reproductive Healthcare Access to protect abortion access where it remains legal, including medication abortion and emergency contraception. On Monday, the President hosted an event celebrating the recently passed gun legislation and, at 5:00 p.m., revealed the first image from the \$10 billion Webb Space telescope in an event live streamed on NASA TV. On Tuesday, the President hosted a meeting with Mexican President Andrés Manuel López Obrador (who skipped the Summit of the Americas in Los Angeles last month in protest of Cuba, Venezuela and Nicaragua not being invited). On Wednesday through Saturday, the President traveled to Israel, the West Bank, and Saudi Arabia.

3. **INFLATION REPORT.** On Wednesday, the Labor Department released its June inflation report, which was expected to show an 8.8% year-over-year increase. Last

Friday, the June jobs report showed that the economy added 372,000 jobs, which was 100,000 more than expected, although the number is in line with the 368,000 jobs created in April and 384,000 in May. The private sector has now regained its pre-pandemic number of jobs, while the public sector remains 664,000 jobs below February 2020. Average hourly earnings increased by 5.1% in the year through June, moderating slightly from 5.3% in the year through May, but nonetheless strong enough that experts predict that the Federal Reserve will call for another 75 basis-point interest-rate increase when the Federal Open Market Committee meets July 26-27 (matching the increase implemented in June).

4. **JANUARY 6 COMMITTEE.** The House January 6 Committee held a hearing on Tuesday at 10:00 a.m., led by Rep. Jamie Raskin (D-MD), to investigate any “convergence of interests” between the Trump White House and the Proud Boys and Oath Keepers, the leadership of

which is currently being prosecuted by the Justice Department on seditious conspiracy cases with trials to begin in December 2022. Reuters reported that the committee would hold a 2nd hearing on Thursday evening (July 14).

5. **LEGISLATIVE OUTLOOK.** Lawmakers will continue strategizing this week on how to advance their major priorities this summer as they face a barrage of deadlines. Two packages, a bipartisan legislation (H.R. 4521) to bolster competitiveness with China and a budget reconciliation bill covering

key Democratic priorities, are likely to dominate talks. After the August recess, lawmakers are faced with a September 30 deadline to extend government spending and several expiring programs.



AAMU Facilitates Virtual Summer Cultural Program

Alabama A&M University successfully launched a recent two-week Summer 2022 Virtual Student International Program in Malaga, Spain & Salvador, Brazil: Business and Culture. The program was fully funded by U.S. Department of Education in partnership with the Center for Global Business (CGB).

The transformative and interactive 30-hour virtual program was provided by Brazil Cultural for seven students and two professors from AAMU and two students from the Instituto Cultural Steve Biko in Brazil. The seven AAMU undergraduate students were Akhia Floyd, Maken-

zie Griffin, Garrett Hicks, Nachaka Lizubuh, Khalid Smith, Ashton Turner (from College of Business & Public Affairs) and Dr. Bobweal O. Omontese, an MBA student and AAMU faculty member from the College of Agricultural, Life and Natural Sciences. Dr. Xia Zhang, the College of Business & Public Affairs (COBPA), international program coordinator, participated and coordinated this two-week program. Dr. Reyna Esquivel-King, the assistant professor of history, assisted and participated in the second week of the program.

The course, led by Dr. Javier Escudero, Brazil

Cultural Director, explored the development and potential of the tourist, culture, and real estate industries in two cities, one in the Mediterranean (Málaga, Andalusia, Spain) and on in the Atlantic (Salvador, Bahia, Brazil), while looking at the historical, social, economic and cultural factors that have shaped those industries up to today.

There were presentations by Dr. Lucigleide Nascimento about Brazilian Economy; Dan Serradilla—History and Tourism in Spain; Gustavo García—Culture, Economy, Emigration and Real State in Spain; Tatiana Damasceno—What is Wrong Brazil


and Brazilian Culture and Entrepreneurship; Kayanara Leeb—the Cultural and Tourist Industries in Bahia; and Javier Escudero—Brazilian History and Culture, Spanish Culture.

The comparison between the European and the South American cities allowed participants to understand important issues related to colonization, development, migration and urbanization. The Alabama students demonstrated cultural openness & flexibility through engagement with local Brazilian counterparts and reflected on issues of race, privilege, identity and heritage.

An Invitation and Metaphor

Matthew 11:29

John introduced Jesus as the Word, God, who became flesh and dwelt among us. As God the Son, He was part of the “us” who appears in creation, creating the heavens and the earth. Part of the heavens included what is known as The Milky Way, which contains an estimated 100-400 billion stars and a least that number of planets.



Issuing invitations requires communication, but how does one capable of creating worlds and people communicate in a way that a person can understand? The metaphor serves that purpose.

As you know, they compare two objects or concepts that have something in common. That first audience in Jesus’ day that heard this invitation to “Come unto Me” was knowledgeable of what a yoke is. Yokes were placed on the necks of two animals that pulled a cart or plow. They kept them in step with each other so that no one animal would have to work harder than the other.

The invitation was to



those who “labor and were heavy laden.” The promise was rest, achieved by the easiness of His yoke. In other words, when one walks with Jesus, He yokes

Himself to them and keeps them in step with the One who is the Way.

Those of us who grew up in the Black Church are familiar with metaphorical

language. “He’s a battle-ax in the time of the battle, shelter in the time of the storm.” “Lawyer in the courtroom.” Finish it ...


