

OU President Calls for Action

As a response to the tragedies of July 5-6, on Thursday, July 7, Leslie N. Pollard, president of Oakwood University, utilized Facebook in a

Live message to ask one question: What could be done to ensure the safety of our black men? His question was a direct response to that week's report of two fatal shootings of black males, both occurring within 24 hours of each other. Like many in the country, Pollard's heart was heavy with grief as he

proposed a "call to action," which would ultimately be grounded in the faith perspectives of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, and consistent with the aims of biblical passages, such as Micah 6:6-8, Isaiah 58:1-14, Proverbs 31:8-9, and Revelation 14:6-12.

The Facebook Live "Call to Action" specifically invited Oakwood graduates who are practicing law to come together on a conference call to brainstorm solutions to how to end the violence and be a redemptive force for justice. In addition to the 300 conference call participants, Facebook Live registered almost 6,800 viewers for the live feed, with an audience reach of 329,000 per-

> sons, according to Facebook analytics. Participants included alumni and friends who felt compelled to find out how they could help.

Various topics were discussed including: Education on how to interact with law enforcement; Sensitivity training/ education for law enforce-

ment; How to serve communities by engaging with the creation of public policy; Establishment of a core group of attorneys who can help students; Establishment of a national standard for reasonable force; and Lobbying members of Congress for peace initiatives.

Dr. Pollard and a selected team of advisors will continue to sift through the information, organize for action, and meet with this newly developed action team. Persons interested in participating may forward contact information to pr@oakwood.edu.

Turning Pillowcases into Dresses for Africa

Chapters from all over the world delivered dresses the International Conference in Atlanta, GA, July 9th – 14th. The dresses will then be shipped directly to preselected communities in Africa. The Epsilon Gamma Omega (EGO)

to accomplish this goal. The dresses were not only made of pillowcases, but that of bandanas, ribbon and yards of fabric.

During the sewing sessions, members would sew, cut fabric and iron the dresses. When the community heard about the service project, people from across the Tennessee Valley volunteered their services in many different forms.

Here are the top issues in Washington, D.C., this week:

1. The House and Senate are in recess until September 6.

2. President Obama will host baseball's 2015 World Champion Kansas City Royals at the White House on Thursday and also is expected to sign the first major bill addressing the abuse of opioids and heroin (the "Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act"), which will expand prevention and educational efforts, promote treatment and recovery, and make naloxone more widely available to law enforcement agencies and other first responders to help in the reversal of overdoses. He is also expected to sign the geneticallymodified (GMO) food labeling bill passed by Congress last week that will require most food packages to carry a text label, a symbol, or an electronic code readable by smartphone that indicates whether the food contains GMO ingredients.

3. 2016 Presidential Watch. The GOP Convention in Cleveland gavels up today at 1:00 p.m. Speakers today will include Me-

Federal Judge Hears Local Committee

Led by Pastor T. C. Johnson of St. Luke Christian Church, members of the local community and new plaintiffs appeared before

Judge Madeline Haikala on Monday, July 18, to argue that they had been denied impartial rep-

resentation on and access to progress in the 2015 consent decree due to the composition of the Desegregation Advisory Committee (DAC). There also were complaints regarding the lack of responses by the Justice Department. Atty. Mark Debro argued on behalf of local citizens. Atty. J. R Books indicated that Northwest Huntsville was more represented on the DAC than other areas of the city. Along with Sonny Hereford IV, parents Rev. Gregory

Bentley, Lameshia Jennings and Paul Proctor plan to join the lawsuit as plaintiffs. Judge Haikala plans to talk with the 12-member DAC before ruling on the information presented. The consent decree last year

aimed to replace the longstanding desegregation order under which Huntsville City Schools had operated.

Drake State Finds Dual-Degee Program

J.F. Drake State Community and Technical College is proud of their ongoing efforts to continually improve dual enrollment offerings and processes. Students in the Tennessee Valley from both public, private, and home schools are recognizing the potential for career opportunities in technical areas such as computer information systems, business, accounting, welding, culinary, and automotive.

Consequently, Drake State is seeing a higher level of student interest in dual enrollment opportunities. As a result, Drake State is working continuously to improve processes, coordinate dual enrollment classes with local schools, and expand dual enrollment course offerings.

"Dual enrollment ties nicely with the Drake State mission of offering flexible and cost-effective means of educating students while providing customized workforce

training that benefits the community and local employers," stated Melinda Inglis, Career Coach at Drake State. She continued: "Faculty and staff are committed to working tirelessly to provide as many dual enrollment opportunities to students as possible while continuously enhancing and improving our dual enrollment program."

The Governor's Office of Workforce Development has awarded J.F. Drake State Community and Technical College "Dual Enrollment" scholarship funding. This funding is for "Career - Technical" program courses.

This scholarship will provide for tuition, fees, books and supplies to enroll high school students from 10th through 12th grades in STEM technical programs. This allows students to earn college credit for courses that contain the college level course requirements that are already being taught by qualified instructors

The list of program offerings are: Accounting Technology, Automotive Technology, Computer and Information Systems Technology (Cyber Security), Computer Maintenance Technology, Culinary Arts and Hospitality Management, Electrical Engineering Technology, Engineering Design Technology (Drafting); Electrical Technology; Heating and Air Conditioning (HVAC), Industrial Systems Technology (Robotics), Machine Tool Technology, Medical Assisting Technology, Office Administration Technology, Welding Technology.

Many Drake State programs offer certificate awards for as little as 9 credit hours of course work. This would be a two- or threecourse sequence depending on the program.
