I was born the 13th child of my parents the only one **not** born on a plantation. We wore what we had, not what we wanted. I believe that the ill-fitting, hand-me-down shoes of my childhood led to my now intense, throbbing neuropathy. My condition isn't caused by diabetes; so my doctors can't explain it. But I live with it every single day.

As a young professional, I often had to take off my shoes and massage my feet just to make it through the evening. Now, I have a disability placard because most days I need it. So when I park in a handicapped space, don't look at me like I'm doing something wrong. Disability doesn't always look the way you expect. It doesn't always involve





a cane, wheelchair, or limp.

One day in the Lowe's parking lot on Mastin Lake Road, a small-framed blond woman confronted my husband—who had had *two* back surgeries and *four* total knee replacements—for using a handicapped space. I thank God that Bill was a Christian man, because that could've ended badly.

To the women who do this, particularly probing, self-righteous women, I say this: mind your own business. You don't know our stories, and your assumptions are more harmful than helpful. And, while we're being honest, don't forget that people of all cultural backgrounds benefited from affirmative action, too. The door to the workplace didn't open just for people of color—it opened for you, too.

So, before you judge, take a moment to reflect. We're not so different. And, if we spent less time judging each other and more time standing together, America would be a better place for all of us!



ON AUGUST 3: African American Captures British General Prescott: African Americans continued to serve in the colonial militias, and some, like Prince, an African American man in Lieutenant Colonel Barton's Rhode island army, showed great daring and bravery. Early in August 1777, Colonel Barton conceived a plan to capture British Major General Prescott, commander of the Royal Army at Newport, Rhode Island, to effect a trade for a captured American general. Leading an army of forty men in two boats, Barton landed five miles from Newport and advanced on foot to the headquarters of General Prescott, where the colonel, with a stout African American close behind him, and another at a small distance, confronted and then overwhelmed a sentry. While the other men surrounded the house, an African American man named Prince, instantly thrust his head through the panel door, and seized his victim, Prescott while in bed. While Colonel Barton received an elegant sword for his exploits, Prince, the actual captor of the general, received nothing. In that sense, Prince was not exceptional. African Americans played a pivotal, decisive role in battles only to have that role forgotten afterward.

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TVW ASKS AURT IRMA 000 **Black Leaders and the Eugenics Movement**

The eugenics movement, which originated in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, promoted the idea that certain human populations were genetically superior to others and sought to encourage the breeding of the "fit" while discouraging or preventing the reproduction of the "unfit." While the movement was primarily associated with promoting white superiority and was used to justify various forms of discrimination and sterilization against marginalized communities, some African Americans and black leaders were influenced by or involved with eugenic ideas.

A few points to note:

W.E.B. Du Bois: Du Bois, a preeminent African American intellectual and civil rights activist, had complex views on eugenics. While he strongly opposed the racist application of eugenic principles, he believed in the idea of the "Talented Tenth," a term he popularized which referred to the leadership class of African Americans.

He believed that this group had a responsibility to guide and uplift the rest of the race. Although his ideas here had some parallels with eugenic thought, it's essential to understand them within the broader context of his overall beliefs, which were oriented towards racial uplift and equality.

Promotion of Better

Health: Some African American leaders supported aspects of the eugenics movement that aligned with their broader goals of improving the health and well-being of the Black community. This sometimes involved supporting public health measures, campaigns against venereal disease, or advocating for family planning. Such support was often not rooted in ideas of inherent racial inferiority but rather in efforts to improve community health and socio-economic conditions.

Nuanced Views: It's important to understand that the

views of Black leaders on eugenics were diverse and nuanced. While some may have seen value in certain eugenic practices or ideas, they often did so from a position of wanting to counteract the extreme racism and discrimination that African Americans faced. In other cases, Black leaders and intellectuals outright rejected eugenic ideas.

Opposition: Many Black leaders and intellectuals were staunchly opposed to eugenics, recognizing its inherent racism and the dangers it posed to African American communities. They spoke out against forced sterilizations, discriminatory policies, and the misuse of science to justify racial hierarchies.

Intersection with Birth Control Movement: The early birth control movement, led by figures like Margaret Sanger, sometimes intersected with eugenic ideas. While Sanger herself held some eugenic beliefs,

she also collaborated with African American leaders to improve access to contraception for Black communities. This collaboration was not without controversy, as some Black leaders were concerned about the potential misuse of birth control for eugenic purposes.

In summary, while the eugenics movement primarily had white proponents and was used to further racist agendas, its influence


was broad and complex, touching various aspects

of society, including some segments of the African American community. The views of Black leaders on eugenics were diverse, ranging from cautious engagement to outright opposition. - TVW/ChatGPT







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Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington, D.C.:

1. CONGRESS. The House is in recess until September 2, after abruptly adjourning early last Wednesday when it became apparent that the House GOP leadership would rather adjourn than be forced to vote on releasing files pertaining to deceased child sex trafficker Jeffrey Epstein – although on the same day the House Oversight Committee issued a subpoena to Epstein crony Ghislaine Maxwell for a deposition to occur at Federal Correctional Institution Tallahassee (FL) on August 11, 2025, after a motion made in committee by Rep. Tim Burchett (R-TN). The Senate is in session and will start the week working on its backlog of 144 administration nominees (the pace of which has drawn pointed criticism from the President who is urging the Senate GOP leadership to cancel its August recess that begins at the end of this week) and then may turn to a 3-bill "mini omnibus" appropriations bill containing the FY2026 MilCon/VA, Agriculture, and Commerce/ Justice/Science bills.

2. EXECUTIVE

BRANCH. The President wrapped up a 4-day visit to Scotland Monday with a meeting with U.K. Prime Minister Keir Starmer and then a ribbon-cutting at his new golf course in Aberdeenshire. On Sunday, he met with European **Commission President** Ursula von der Leyen on a trade deal for the European Union that will see a 15% baseline tariff on most EU goods (down from a threatened 30%). Friday (1 Aug) is the deadline for countries to work out deals to avoid the higher tariffs. It was reported on Friday that the White House will release \$5 billion in frozen public school funding. However, reports on the same day indicated that the White House will send Congress another rescissions bill this fall aimed at clawing back previously appropriated federal education funds. The Washington Post reported that last week was the deadline for the National Park Service to submit its review of books and signs at national parks to remove "corrosive ideology," which included removing books on slavery and civil rights and signs referring to the "Gulf of Mexico" and climate change. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins announced on Thursday that the department will relocate 2.600 workers more than half of its Washington, D.C., workforce - to 5 hubs around the country: Raleigh, NC; Kansas City, MO; Indianapolis, IN; Fort Collins, CO; and Salt Lake City, UT. Last week, Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche questioned

Jeffrey Epstein crony (and

convicted felon) Ghislaine Maxwell, in depositions over 2 days at a prison in Florida where she is serving a sentence for sex trafficking underage girls.

3. SUPREME COURT.

In an emergency order issued on Wednesday, the Supreme Court cleared the way for the Trump administration to remove three of the five members (all appointed by President Biden) of the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). At the same time, their challenges to their firings continue. Under the laws creating the CPSC, a commissioner can only be removed by the president "for neglect of duty or malfeasance in office."

4. FEDERAL RESERVE

MEETING. The Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee meets this Tuesday and Wednesday. It is expected to leave interest rates unchanged, especially after last week's inflation report that saw a jump in the annual inflation to 2.7%. On

5. U.S. DOGE SERVICE.

The Washington Post reported on Sunday that the U.S. DOGE Service is deploying a new artificial intelligence tool to analyze 200,000 federal regulations, to eliminate half of them by January 2026. According to a PowerPoint presentation obtained by the Post, federal agencies have a deadline of Sept. 1, 2025, to compile a list of regulations to eliminate, and DOGE has already started training federal staffers on how to use the AI tool. The Post further pointed out that it is unclear if courts will allow the administration to

void rules, while privatesector companies tend to be uncomfortable ignoring a rule that was illegally repealed.

6. UNIVERSITY ANTI-SEMITISM INVESTIGA-TIONS. The Washington Post reported that the White House is putting pressure on Harvard, Northwestern, Cornell, Brown, and the University of Michigan to pay millions to the government to settle investigations into alleged antisemitism connected to pro-Palestinian campus protests during the 2023-24 school year. Last Wednesday, Columbia University agreed to pay \$200 million to settle claims over antisemitism and discriminatory hiring and install an independent monitor (in turn, the feds will unfreeze \$1 billion in federal grants).



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


