



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Democratic Presidential Nominee Kamala Harris: "Come, see a Woman, . . ." (Part 3 of 3) "Come, see a man, . . ." John 4:29

In this earlier text, the Samaritan woman responds to Jesus' presenting her with an opportunity of a lifetime: become the first female and the first Gentile evangelist for Christianity to the non-Jewish world - preceding even the Apostle Pau l.

Her "Come, see a man" message to her fellow Samaritans set in motion Christianity's now being the world's largest religion with 2.4 billion followers.

Similarly, on July 21 after deciding to exit the presidential race, Joe Biden presented his VP Kamala Harris the opportunity to become the first woman of color to evangelize and lead freeworld democracy. Immediately, she updated the earlier Samaritan woman's call to action now

to be "Come, see a Woman, ..." And her converts continue to meet Biden's unprecedented offer in an unprecedented way.

If successful political campaigns need both fund- and friend-raising, then political history is witnessing the Kama-love Effect:

... and the early Kama-love Result?

The story of the Samaritan woman at Jacob's Well concluded with "Many of the Samaritans from that town believed . . . because of the women's testimony" John 4:39.

Similarly, the story of Kamala Harris has created a testament that has brought believers to her crusade. She secured the Democratic nomination without one primary contest, and caused first-time donors and volunteers to join in record numbers.

The only question that remains is, will that testimony and belief carry her into the White House?

Mrs. Brenda Beale is a native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, and the daughter of the late CSM (Ret.) George and Mary Harris. However, she spent most of her early childhood and adolescent years in Germany and various locations throughout the United States. Upon the family's return to stateside, a young Brenda made history when she became the first African American to attend East Gate Junior High School in Dale County, while her dad was stationed at Fort Rucker in Ozark, Alabama.

Her family eventually returned to Tuscaloosa and settled within the town's vibrant black community known fondly as Stillman Hill. Brenda, after much travel around the world, was still afforded the golden opportunity to graduate from the esteemed Druid High School. During her senior year at Druid, Brenda was crowned Miss Black Alabama in 1970 in a contest coordinated by the famed WENN Radio station in Birmingham.

Beale would then attend the historic Alabama A&M University, where she majored in family and consumer sciences. It is also the beloved institution where her loving husband John W. first wooed her, even though the two

lived less than a block away from each other back in Tuscaloosa. On "The Hill," Brenda developed her fiery Bulldog passion.

Brenda is a retired educator who started her career as an enthusiastic instructor at J.O. Johnson High School in Huntsville for three

years before joining the educational team at Huntsville Middle School and retiring in 2004. Throughout the decades, she has amassed experience in leadership, communications, relationships, adaptability, teamwork, decision making, planning and problem solving, as well as public relations.

Mrs. Beale is a Diamond Life member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and a member of the Huntsville Alumnae Chapter. Additionally, she has served as advisor to the Delta Delta (AAMU) and Omicron Gamma (University of Alabama in Huntsville) collegiate chapters. Brenda is a member of the Alpha Omega Chapter of Eta Phi Beta Business and Professional Sorority, Inc., as well as an active Kappa Silhou-



ette (past local president, and national and regional parliamentarian) for more than 45 years, providing continuous support to the organization and the men of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

On the day the children's choir was set to leave for Disney World, I sat on my bike in my best friend's driveway. It was sunny with that slight spring chill in the air. My friend and his siblings were carrying luggage and things for the trip from the house to the car. I just sat there watching, no sadness, no regrets, just gazing on the activity. As far as I was concerned, I had accomplished my goal of selling enough candy to pay for my choir robe. After a while, my friend's mother's voice cut through my trance. She was calling me. My mom was on the phone. Was I in trouble for something?

On the phone, my mom asked with excitement in her voice if I wanted to go on the trip. Did I want to go on the trip?! Was she crazy or had I just lost my mind. "Huh?" was my reply. She repeated the question with a little more gusto. This time my good sense kicked in although I still didn't know what was going on. Of course, my answer was yes. She told me to hurry up and come home to pack. I tore out of there on my bike like I'd been called by God or chased by the devil. On my way home my mind raced faster than I could pedal. This was a dream come true.

While I packed as fast as I could my mother explained to me that the choir director called. I had sold so much candy, it earned me a spot on the trip. I had been so driven by the desire to keep my parents from having to worry about that choir robe and the sheer rush of the sell, I had secured an all expenses paid trip to Disney World. To a child who loved everything Disney, this was almost beyond belief. She gave me a crisp \$10 bill and I was on my way.

My drive and intent had netted me more than a trip to the Magic Kingdom. It was a passport to possibility! All I'd needed was an opportunity to kickstart my solution finder. At ten years old, I had been armed with the knowledge of available

power to make change in my circumstance. The trip down to Florida was an incredible journey in itself. I watched the landscape change - From tall southern pines to majestic live oaks draped with ghostly moss that finally gave way to palm trees and other tropical foliage. Then that magical place called Disney World.

It was more than a trip for me. It was a tear in the veil of my perceived limits, a glimpse through the keyhole to a place where my vision took root. That trip expanded my view beyond the world in which I existed - beyond the high wall of poverty on to the land of possibilities. It made possible probable.

Walt Disney's vision and imagination continue to inspire me. It all started with a mouse." He said. A seemingly small thing backed with imagination, faith, and intent, can net a major return. Even beyond our wildest dreams. That summer a long time ago, I was granted a key that opened the door to a glimpse of my mouse. Over the years, I drew and painted my way out of poverty. There's a path for all who truly desire to go beyond where they are, ours is but to find it. Where there is possibility, there is power.

A&M's Marching Maroon & White Band 'Going Back to Cali'

The Alabama A&M University Marching Maroon and White will be one of six historically black college/university (HBCU) bands to perform at the 2025 Honda Battle of the Bands at SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, Calif.

One of the band's landmark performances was its appearance as lead of the 2006 Rose Parade in Pasadena, Calif.

Last week, the AAMU Band accepted a challenge invitation from the North Carolina A&T State University marching band to secure its spot in the event to be held Saturday, February 1, 2025.

For over two decades, the Honda Battle of the Bands has been a premiere stage for the showcasing of top HBCU band programs. Six invitations for the 2025 event are being selected in



three phases. Last month, a Honda committee selected two HBCU bands. Each of those bands were then allowed to "challenge" an

HBCU band to participate in a face-off in Inglewood. Committee selections and challenge selections include: the **Alabama** A&M University Marching Maroon and White; the North Carolina A&T State University Blue and Gold Marching Machine; the **Southern University** Human Jukebox; and the **Alabama State University** band. The final two bands are being selected via fan voting through August 15 at www.hondabattleofthebands.com.

About the Honda Battle of the Bands

Honda made a commitment in 2003 to highlight the heart-stopping musical talent of HBCU marching bands. Since then, Honda Battle of the Bands has served as the blueprint for showcasing one of the most recognizable and celebrated examples of HBCU culture and tradition to the rest of the world.

HBOB continues to evolve into a platform built for and by the HBCU community. Known as the marching band homecoming event of the year, HBOB has hosted some of the greatest performances and moments in HBCU battle of the bands' history.
