# Huntsville Approves Third Road Resurfacing Contract of FY24

The City of Huntsville will move forward on resurfacing all or parts of 54 streets in Huntsville with the approval of a \$4,962,525 contract with Rogers Group Inc.

It's the third resurfacing contract City Council has approved in the 2024 fiscal year.

The three contracts altogether include all or parts of almost 200 City streets for resurfac-



ing.

Among the projects in Phase 3 are the resurfacing of road sections that include Adventist Boulevard, Andrew Jackson Way, California Street, Drake Avenue, Gallatin Street, Greene Street, Holmes Avenue, Mastin Lake, Max Luther, Ninth Avenue SW, Old Monrovia Road, and sections of Pulaski Pike.

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

Question: Are you satisfied with the gifts and talents that God has blessed you with?





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
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### Davids can always beat Goliaths, Trump and Putin!

"Behold, I am coming like a thief! Blessed is the one who stays awake, ...!" - Revelation 16:15

Ukrainian troops caught Russia by surprise. They captured 1,000 square kilometers (386 square miles) inside its Kursk territory, 74 of its settlements, and hundreds of Russian soldiers surrendered. And all this occurred in six days, to Putin's embarrassment.

Similarly, Kamala Harris attacked Trump's presumed electability, following Biden's July 21st surprise announcement of her now leading the ticket. And in just six days, Harris raked in millions of new donors, and thousands of volunteers. Top Republicans began enlisting into the Kamala camp. "Giants are not what we think they are. The same qualities that appear to give them strength are often the source of great weakness," he explained.

Being perceived as the underdog often allows them to surprise-attack their favored opponents, he continued, and "can open doors and create opportunities and educate and enlighten and make possible what might otherwise have seemed unthinkable."

Gladwell's book title and overall theme refers to the Bible's 1 Samuel chapter 17 account of 5-foot, 8-inch shepherd boy David killing the 9-foot, 6-inch Goliath, catching the enemy giant and his Philistine army off guard.

Ukraine's Russian invasion caught Putin and the Kremlin off guard, much like Harris' replacing Biden to head the Democratic presidential ticket upended Trump and his GOP's presumed cake walk return to the presidency. To date, Trump remains as flustered by the Democrats' surprise invasion into the 2024 electoral battle as his friend Putin remains equally flummoxed by the upstart Ukrainian army seizing the war's initiative. Gladwell insists that determined and prepared Davids can win!

Like the Ukrainian troops, resuscitated Democrats, and other successful underdog Davids, be prepared to now topple now your Goliaths. Since you are perceived as the underdog, you already possess an under-the-radar edge of being unassuming. With your strategy and their arrogance, victory might be easier than you think!

Mr. Rufus Gilmore, III, is a product of the Birmingham Public School System and a 1968 graduate of Carver High School. Upon completing high school, he attended Miles College and earned the B.S. degree in business administration with a concentration in accounting. Upon graduating from Miles, he received an offer to work in Student Services in the Office of Financial Aid at his Alma Mater. After working for seven years, he enrolled in Atlanta University and received an MBA with a concentration in accounting in 1974.

In 1976, Gilmore was offered a position at Alabama A&M University as assistant professor of accounting. He advised the Accounting Club and accompanied students to various professional meetings, including the Black CPA Recruiting Conference, where many AAMU students received positions in accounting.

He was later offered a position by AAMU President John T. Gibson to direct the Alabama A&M University Foundation. As director of the Foundation, Gilmore was able to computerize the accounting system and provide reports to the various stake holders. He also managed the Trust Fund for Educational Excellence with assets of over \$32 million. During his tenure as director, he received a clean audit of his financial records each

year by Ernst & Young. Gilmore is a founding member of the Huntsville/ Madison County Miles College National Alumni Association and served for more than 20 years as its president. He currently serves as the Huntsville chapter's treasurer.

In 1977, the multi-talented accountant and musician was offered a position as organist and director of the Youth Choir at St. John AME Church, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Homer L. McCall. During his thirty years as director of music, he served the Gospel Choir, Senior Choir and the Male Chorus.

During his tenure as director of music, Gilmore organized the Male Chorus, which became a vital part of the Music Department. Every other year, the Music Department would offer an Easter Cantata for the St. John Family and the Huntsville Community.

An integral part of his work in the Music Department was teaching piano to many of the youth of St. John, including: Brooke Rankin, Bobby Rice, Jr., Christina Sanders, Marissa Owens, Wallace Parham, Shannon & Erin Lott and Christopher Butler. Semiannually, he would present a piano recital as part of the music program.

Even Pastor McCall honored Gilmore by offering him a position on the



Steward Board under the former's leadership. While serving as a steward, he was given the responsibility of preparing and presenting the annual financial budget for the church. He served on the Benevolent Committee for many years, looking out for the needs of the church and the Huntsville Community. While serving on this commission, he played a major role in writing the Benevolence Policy for the church.

He has served on the board of the Union Chapel School: treasurer of the Alabama New South Coalition; president of the Huntsville Miles College Alumni Association; treasurer and financial secretary of the Miles College National Alumni Association; and manager of Councill Federal Credit Union. He is the current treasurer of St. John AME church, and he serves on the Steward Board under Pastor Rev. Maurice Wright, II.

# The Surprising Health Risks for Black Men Raised by Single Parents - from BlackDoctor.org

Research from a longterm Howard University Family Study reveals that Black men raised in singleparent households could have higher blood pressure as adults than those who grew up in two-parent homes.

The study, which examined data from 515 men participating in the HUFS and the first of its kind to link the living arrangements of children to adult pressure in Black men, found:

- Men who lived with both parents during one or more years of their childhoods had 4.4 mm Hg lower systolic (top number) blood pressure than those raised entirely in single-parent homes.
- Black children who live with their mothers alone are three times more likely to be poor, and those who live with fathers or a non-parent are twice as likely to be poor.
- A critical period during childhood (ages 1 to 12) and a potential mechanism through which the early life socio-familial factor operates may influence adult blood pressure.

This is the first study



to link childhood family living arrangements with blood pressure in Black men in the United States, who tend to have higher rates of high blood pressure than American men of other races. The findings suggest that programs to promote family stability during childhood might have a long-lasting effect on the risk of high blood pressure in these men.

Although the study found an association between a single-parent upbringing and a higher risk for high blood pressure, it did not prove a cause-andeffect link.

Engage in regular mental health checkins, whether through therapy, counseling, or support groups. 3. *Manage Stress:* Chronic stress, especially from unresolved childhood issues, can lead to high blood pressure and other health problems. Practice stress-reducing activities like meditation, exercise, and mindfulness to keep your physical and mental health in check.

4. *Break the Cycle:* If you experienced an absent or inconsistent father figure, be mindful of repeating this cycle in your relationships.

5. *Healthy Communication:* Open and honest communication within families is key to building trust and resolving conflicts. Encourage discussions about feelings, experiences, and challenges to strengthen family bonds and foster a sense of security.

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
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# 12 August 23, 2024 Induction Ceremony of The National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Inc. Greater Huntsville Area Chapter
