Huntsville Transit Center Opens

Arriving at 521 Pratt Avenue by Orbit bus, Huntsville City leaders cut the ribbon on a new downtown Transit Center.

The facility's 14 bus bays ensure capacity for the fleet and plenty of space for riders to board and disembark. The bays are 45 feet in length, allowing bus arrivals and departures in a more convenient setting.

The ADA-accessible center includes more room for wheelchair customers to maneuver and audio announcements of departures in addition to large platform display monitors.

Another feature is a greenway made possible through the unique architectural design developed by Fuqua & Partners

Minister Leo Robinson was recently named one of Redstone Federal Credit Union's (RFCU) Community Champions.


Community Champions are unsung heroes among us who selflessly contribute to the well-being and improvement of the community.

Here are the top issues and events in Washington for this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in recess until Monday, Sept. 9. According to Punchbowl News, House Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) is planning next week to introduce a bill combining a continuing resolution to keep the government open through March 2025 with legislation – known as the "SAVE Act" – to require proof of citizenship to register to vote in a federal election.

2. THE WHITE HOUSE.

President Biden and Vice President Harris teamed up for a Labor Day campaign event yesterday in Pittsburgh (after VP Harris had a stop in Detroit earlier in the day). The President will travel to Wisconsin on Thursday and Michigan on Friday. Vice President Harris will be in New Hampshire on Wednesday and then travel to Pittsburgh on Thursday. One week from today on Sept. 10, the Harris-Trump debate will take place at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, hosted by ABC News at 9:00 p.m. EDT. Yesterday, the President and Vice President met with the U.S. hostage negotiating team regarding the remaining hostages held by Hamas in Gaza.

3. SUPREME COURT. The Supreme Court is adjourned and will reconvene on Monday, Oct. 7. Last Wednesday, the Court declined to allow the Department of Education to put into effect a July 2023 rule, known as the SAVE Plan, intended to provide debt relief for lower-income student loan borrowers while challenges to the rule continue in the lower courts (note: the July 2023 rule was promulgated after the Supreme Court quashed an effort by the Biden Administration to cancel up to \$400 billion in student loans in the decision Biden v. Nebraska).

4. ECONOMIC NEWS.

Last Thursday, Commerce Department unexpectedly revised upward its 2nd quarter gross domestic product figure from 2.8% to 3.0%, fueled by strong consumer spending and business investment - marking a sharp acceleration from the 1Q's 1.4% growth rate. On Friday, the Commerce Department announced that prices rose just 0.2% from June to July, up slightly from the previous month's 0.1% increase - but not enough to drive up the annual rate, which is unchanged at 2.5%. The Federal Reserve is widely expected to lower interest rates starting at its next Federal Open Market Committee meeting on Sept. 17-18 and, by year's end, futures markets expect the Fed to cut its key short-term rate three times by a total of as


much as a percentage point.

5. POLLS. As of Sept. 2, the FiveThirtyEight site's average of national president election polls shows Vice President Harris leading former President Trump by 3.2 points, with Harris at 47.1% and Trump at 43.8%. On the congressional generic ballot average, using polls in which respondents are asked what party they would support in election, Democrats lead Republicans by 2.3 points, 46.9% to 44.6%. 6. EDUCATION. On August 27, the U.S. Education Department (ED) announced more details of its plan to test the 2025-26 FAFSA process with a select group of organizations and students beginning October 1 and then gradually open it to all by

December 1. ED says it will work with community-based organizations (CBOs), high schools, institutions of higher education, states and limited groups of students and contributors to fill out and submit the form. With each beta test, ED will increase the number of participating students and contributors, starting first with hundreds, then growing to tens of thousands by the final beta test. To start, the department is accepting applications from interested CBOs until September 5. 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Legacies Being Made ... Right Before Our Eyes!

It was a momentous occasion to witness Kamala Harris become the first woman of color to accept a major party nomination at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago. But what's even more significant is the legacy-making happening right before our eyes ...



As the ancient words of Isaiah 11:6 remind us, ". . . and a little child shall lead them." This sentiment was vividly brought to life in a photograph by New York Times photojournalist Todd Heisler. The image, which quickly went viral, captured the eight-year-old, pig-tailed grandniece of Kamala Harris, Amara Ajagu, looking on as her great-aunt broke through yet another glass ceiling. This moment encapsulates the profound impact Harris' nomination could have on young girls everywhere.

Leadership expert and author Dr. John C. Maxwell makes a crucial distinction between inheritance—"what you leave for your family after

you're gone"—and legacy—"what you put in your family while you're still alive!" Kamala Harris's legacy of leader-ship was evident even before she delivered her acceptance speech. In a memorable moment at the DNC, Amara and her six-year-old sister Leela taught the audience how to pronounce their great-aunt's first name: "Comma," like the punctuation mark, then "La," like the sing-song "la, la, la." These young girls, with their playful yet powerful instruction, exemplify the ripple effect of Harris's legacy and why names are important in any civilized society. Moreover, it is never good to intentionally mispronounce anyone's name. Our parents gave us our names and that contributes to each of our legacies.

This moment prompts us to ponder: Is Kamala Harris a queen, a queenmaker—or both? Hindu statesman and philosopher Chanakya once posed the question, "Who is more powerful: a king or a kingmaker?" He concluded, "Anyone can become a king; a king eventually will lose his position over time. Whereas a kingmaker can make many kings." Kamala Harris, as captured in Heisler's photo, might well embody both roles—queen and queenmaker. The upper portion of the image shows Harris, poised and powerful, accepting her party's presidential nomination. The lower part reveals an eight-year-old girl, gazing up at her great-aunt, perhaps seeing both a current role model who looks like her and a future leader she herself could become.

Huntsville and attending Lakeside United Methodist Church, our annual fall celebration, was "Bringing in the Sheaves." What joy it was as children of the community to acknowledge new beginnings in Christ and/ or crops. Many marriages took place, although not requiring a particular time of year, and families were established.

One of those marriages in 1901 in Madison County was that of David Dixon Barley and Rhoda Abernathy Barley. They were my grandparents. I am fascinated by what getting to know one another, sharing their dreams and promises and ultimately exchanging commitment yows to one

another might have been like. Their marriage, like so many of that time, had many challenges to overcome, but they took the opportunity, the promise of new beginnings, to form a committed marriage union and start their life together. This was their own new beginning; a new season of location, of farm ownership, of parenting and being a foundational blessing for generations of their family and community.

The David Dixon and Rhoda Abernathy Barley family owned a large, three hundred and forty-five acre commercial farm in Pond Beat, Ala. (the land that is now known as Redstone Arsenal). They birthed and raised a family of sixteen (with one set of twins) children, ten girls and six boys, and they were early and active members in the Center Grove, Pond Beat United Methodist Church and The Rosenwald Horton School.

Any one of their accomplishments would be noteworthy but, taken together, theirs is a compelling Huntsville family story of the past, present and even into the future. Soon the family is to be 125 years old; it is fitting to look at what we produced then and now.

2024 Voter Suppression 2.0 - and the "Cookie Jar"!

"There are way too many of the Israelites for us to handle. We've got to do something: Let's devise a plan to contain them ..." - Exodus 1:7,8

Ancient Egypt's pharaoh devised enslavement intended to suppress the growing Israelite population.

The plan failed and led ultimately to the Israelites' explosive growth and subsequent liberation.

Just as Egyptian overlords failed to suppress Israelite growth, current Republican-controlled state legislatures will fail to suppress but will actually grow voter turnout, . . .

... According to American sociologist Robert K. Merton . . . and your and my childhood's cookie jar.

The Law of Unintended Consequences

Merton popularized the "law of unintended consequences": outcomes of purposeful actions that are not intended or foreseen do often happen. For example:

- The Egyptian Empire's attempt to suppress the Children of Israel's population with 400 years of enslavement actually increased the latter's numbers; the hardship forced the enslaved closer together;
- Angered by increased young people's and people of color's voting in the 2020 presidential elections, many state legislatures are still seeking unsuccessfully to "enslave" this growth by suppressing their voting rights; and
- The Supreme Court's June 2022 decision overturning Roe v. Wade and women's control over their own reproductive rights resulted in women's unprecedented voter registrations aimed successfully at that November's midterm elections. This November's presidential and state-wide balloting should mirror such.

Perhaps those legislators forgot about their own childhood experiences with the family's cookie jar.

Re-visiting the Alluring Cookie Jar

Many of us remember our parents' orders: "Help yourself to anything in the kitchen, but don't go in the cookie jar." Subsequently, our focus became the cookie jar.

Why? Because just being told that there was something that we could not have only increased our interest and desire for it.

Remembering 2012 ...

In 2012, three north Huntsville (AL) voting precincts were compressed (translation: suppressed) into one. Many of us viewed this as a red-state attempt to discourage our presidential re-election votes. It didn't work.

Although polls closed officially at 7 p.m., the now-longer voting line resulted in the last registrant voting at 9 p.m.

We were not going to be suppressed - or denied our cookie jar of voting!

Why these GOP-filled legislatures don't remember their cookie jar experiences baffles me. Still.





Born and raised in Alabama, Ms. Linda Spalla is a Magna Cum Laude secondary education graduate of Jacksonville State University who taught high school English in Atlanta for three years. She moved to Huntsville in 1971, divorced and began her employment with WHNT-TV 19, where she worked her way up the ladder from sales secretary to President and General Manager of the CBS affiliate, which was owned by the New York Times.

Spalla was the first female General Manager in The New York Times Broadcast Group, and she was one of the first in the Southeast for CBS. During this time, Linda was a mother, daughter, and community enthusiast who never lost her femininity or her Southern roots. She retired from WHNT in 2000 after having moved the station to first place in the market.

She refers to Bernie Verdier as her "late-in-life gift," with whom she began a new life of travel and adventure in 2004 following her retirement. Currently, she loves her grandchildren, golf, her book club of 20+ years, crossword puzzles, and summer travels to Paris.



She is the author of three books: Leading Ladies (2003), which offers practical leadership tips for women, encouraging them to embrace their femininity as a leadership asset; Catch Your Breath (2014), which presents a raw, honest series of meditations for caregivers based on her experiences in caring for her own mother; and Bernie's Paris ... Travel Stories with Love (2016), which provides decade-long experiences of escapades in Paris.

Community service has widened Linda's influence in the Huntsville area for many years. Among her board affiliations are the Burritt Museum, Crestwood Medical Center, Crestwood Women's Advisory Council, UAH School of Business Advisory Board, Alabama Space and Rocket Center Advisory Council, Better

She is a 1994 Leadership graduate of Class 8, the winner of the Girl's Inc. "She Know's Where She's Going" Award, the recipient of the Silver Medal Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Huntsville/Decatur Advertising Federation. She has been a mentor in Rotary's Strive program and for the WEDC Foundation. She also served on the board of the Alabama Writers' Forum in Montgomery for 6 years.
