

Washington One Minute

Here are the latest top issues and events in Washington, D.C.:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session. The House and Senate this week will both be debating the nearly \$1 trillion FY 2026 Defense Authorization bill. However, the Senate GOP Leadership was expected to start the week by changing Senate Rules to further restrict the use of the filibuster on Executive Branch nominees to allow for "en bloc" confirmation of non-Cabinet executive branch nominees (dramatically speeding up the process) ... Notably, neither the House nor the Senate has any appropriations bills scheduled for floor consideration this week despite a looming September 30th government shutdown deadline. The latest rumor is that House Appropriations Committee Chair Tom Cole (R-OK) is favoring a stopgap bill to keep the gov't open through Thanksgiving (to date, of the 12 annual appropriations bills, only the Military Construction/ Veterans Affairs bill has been approved on the floor by the House and Senate).

2. EXECUTIVE BRANCH.

Last Tuesday, the President announced that he would move the U.S. Space Command headquarters from Colorado Springs, CO, to Huntsville, AL. Last Friday, the President issued an executive order reviving the pre-1949 "Department of War" moniker for the Defense Department. Last Thursday, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Danish energy company Orsted sued in federal court to block the Trump administration's stop work order for the 80%-complete, \$6.2 billion Revolution Wind project off the coast of Rhode Island. On August 29, Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy withdrew or terminated \$679 million for 12 port grants intended to support the development of offshore wind power ... Next week, the President and First Lady will travel to the U.K. for a state visit that includes a banquet hosted by King Charles III in St George's Hall at Windsor Castle.

3. SUPREME COURT.

Last Wednesday, the Trump administration filed a petition before the U.S. Supreme Court asking it to decide on an expedited basis whether the President has the authority to impose his "reciprocal" and "fentanyl trafficking" tariffs on China, Mexico, Canada, and a host of other countries using the International Emergency Economic Powers Act of 1977 (on August 29, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit struck down the tariffs). 4. NATIONAL GUARD DEPLOYMENTS. On

September 2, Federal District Court Judge Charles Breyer ruled that it was illegal for the Trump administration to have deployed 4,000 California National Guard troops and 700 Marines to Los Angeles last June in a lawsuit brought by California Gov. Gavin Newsom. The judge ruled that the administration had violated the Posse Comitatus Act of 1878 that bars the military from enforcing domestic laws without explicit permission from Congress, but also stayed his injunction until Sept. 12 to give the White House time to appeal the decision and did not order the withdrawal of the remaining 300 National Guard troops, providing they only perform functions authorized by federal law such as protecting federal property. On September 4, D.C. Attorney General Brian Schwalb filed suit in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia to end the deployment of 2,300 National Guard troops,

including units from 7 states, that were activated on August 11 in Washington, D.C. At a Tuesday (Sept. 2) press conference, the President stated that he intends to send troops to Chicago and several news outlets have reported that the Department of Homeland Security has requested use of the facilities at Naval Station Great Lakes for ICE enforcement and removal operations in the Chicago metropolitan area.

5. AUGUST JOBS REPORT.

The Labor Department announced on Friday that U.S. economy added only 22,000 jobs in August, well below a predicted 75,000 jobs, making the 4th weak jobs report in a row, with the unemployment rate ticking up slightly to 4.3%. Further, revisions to June and July's reports showed a combined 21,000 fewer jobs were created (June was revised down by 27,000,

from +14,000 to -13,000, and the change for July was revised up by 6,000, from +73,000 to +79,000). In view of these disappointing jobs numbers, most observers expect the Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee to lower interest rates this week, after its 2-day meeting on Tuesday and Wednesday.

6. HIGHER EDUCATION.

On Friday, the U.S. Education Department announced it will expand its ombudsman office to include proactive outreach and education efforts aimed at helping families better understand federal student loan borrowing before they take on debt. The decision comes as student loan defaults and delinquencies remain alarmingly high, with over 6 million borrowers (34%) currently delinquent on federal loans and approximately 5.3 million borrowers already in default.

The newly renamed Office of Consumer Education and Ombudsman will also develop a comprehensive "common manual" by July 2026 to standardize federal loan servicing and collection practices across all vendors. Under Secretary Nicholas Kent emphasized that this shift toward earlier engagement is designed to help students make more informed borrowing decisions, ultimately leading to lower debt burdens and better repayment outcomes. The initiative marks a significant policy change from reactive complaint resolution to preventive financial education and regulatory standardization.




ing Maroon and White Band bringing down the house with their sound and precision.


So, as the Bulldogs take the field this season, let us remember—this is more than a game. This is legacy. This is tradition. This is the heartbeat of our community.

Question: What mistakes have you made that keep you a prisoner of the past? What can



Then, we downloaded the Life360 tracking app on all three of our cellphones—not to control our daughter, but to care for her.

We kept this tracking app until the day we:

- Dropped her off at her college freshman residence hall;
- Prayed in a family circle with her; and then
- Each kissed her "goodbye."

If everyday parents like us could provide such boundaries and accountability, why couldn't parents of wealth and influence do the same?

Unless, of course, they were blinded by the glitter of "lifestyles of the rich and famous."

Leadership isn't just for presidents or CEOs. It begins at home.

When parents fail to lead, when they abdicate their sacred duty, the powerful prey on the vulnerable.

First Things First

It's time we not only hold predators accountable, but also first ask hard questions of the parents who failed to protect their children.

The Leadership Role of Listening at Home

When our children mess up, we well-intentioned parents often default to authority, rules, and discipline. But sometimes, what our children need most is not our verdict, but our voice—one that says:

"I believe you."

"Let's figure this out together."

"I'm listening. Tell me what's going on."

CNBC's August 31st article, I've studied over 200 kids—here are 6 'magic phrases' that make children listen to their parents, recently shared these six "magic phrases" that help raise kids who actually listen. They all point toward the same theme: empathy.

1992 presidential candidate Bill Clinton's famous debate moment "I feel your pain" line worked because he entered the listener's space, not the judge's bench. Parents can do the same

Ego-holism Recovering: Become an Active Listener. That means asking What happened? instead of Why did you do that? It means sometimes keeping our mouths closed long enough to hear our children's hearts open.

Leadership expert Dr. John C. Maxwell says, "Give them your heart before you ask for their hand." The Bible says similarly, "Except you become as little children, you cannot enter the Kingdom of Heaven." Both remind us: listening is leadership.

We've been schooled in reading, writing, and speaking, but never in "Listening 101." Yet listening

is the discipline that builds bridges instead of walls, and leaders at home—like leaders in business-must master it.

Because when we truly listen, we can help our children turn bitter lemons not just into better lemonade. but into the best: the sweetest lemon meringue pie!

Moreover, she has trained nursing home staff and the general public in the unique causes of dementia, as well as how to best work with dementia patients.

The multitalented Dixie has worked in the fundraising sector for nearly decade for at least three worthwhile nonprofit organizations. She has served on the Board of Trustees for the Presbyterian Home for Children in Talladega, Ala., for two years. Since its founding in 1868, the Presbyterian Home for Children has led the state in providing services to Alabama's at-risk children. The organization has provided clients with

ing and reunifying families in their own home. This has been a proven and effective method to end cycles of abuse and neglect. PHC's Secure Dwellings Program provides safe and affordable housing on the PHC campus to homeless children and their female caregiver, while dedicated staff work to minister to their needs by empowering the caregiver to achieve goals and reach self-sufficiency, as well as providing a safe haven for homeless children to rest, grow and play. Finally, the Supportive Housing communities throughout the state serve homeless children with their female caregiver.

Dixie has provided useful expertise for six years to Mission Haven, which offers affordable short-term housing and friendly hospitality to missionary families, as well as for students at local seminaries. Her affiliation with RiahRose Home for Children has centered around providing a home for homeless pregnant women and homeless families with young children.

Among her many affiliations are Fellowship Presbyterian Church U.S.A.; The Golden Charmers, an aggregate of older adults focusing on offering support and information on health issues, leisure



pursuits, volunteerism, successful aging, financial well-being and faith in God; Presbyterian Women (moderator and vice moderator), nurturing faith through prayer and Bible study, and advocating for justice and peace; the Chancel Choir; Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.; and the Huntsville Spiritual Chorale, which performs and preserves the coveted Negro Spiritual.

Dixie is also actively involved in the Alpha Omega Chapter (founding member) of Eta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., and its ongoing work to launch services for intellectually and developmentally disabled citizens. She has served as the organization's president, vice president, chaplain and membership intake coordinator.

She was married to the late Dr. Theodore Dixie, Sr., a retired Alabama A&M University professor, and they have one son, Ted, Jr.




sits under a 19,000-squarefoot open-air pavilion on the site of the park's former tennis courts.

Located on 68 acres south of Stringfield Road and west of Pulaski Pike, Stoner Park continues to grow as one of Huntsville's most dynamic recreation hubs.






