Here are the top issues and events in Washington for this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in session this week. The Senate was set to vote Tuesday on the "Right to In Vitro Fertilization (IVF) Act." The House's long list of bills on its floor schedule notably did not include a temporary stopgap spending measure to keep the federal gov't open when current appropriations lapse on Oct. 1. Last week, the House GOP leadership abruptly yanked a stopgap bill to fund the gov't through March 28, 2025, reportedly because it lacked

enough Republican votes. Politico reports that the Senate Democratic Leadership is planning to introduce a stopgap bill that keeps the gov't open through Dec. 13, 2024 ...

2. THE WHITE HOUSE.

President Biden traveled to Philadelphia Monday to deliver remarks at the 2024 National HBCU Week Conference. On Wednesday, he hosted a reception celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month and on Thursday he delivered remarks at the Economic Club of Washington, D.C. and then at

the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute's Awards Gala. On Friday, he will host a Cabinet meeting. On Saturday, President Biden will host the final Quad Summit of his presidency in Wilmington, DE, with the leaders of Australia, India, and Japan – ahead of his speech to the United Nations in New York on Sept. 24 ... The Harris-Walz Campaign announced that it raised \$47 million in the first 24 hours following the debate. On Tuesday Vice President Harris sat for an interview with the National Association of Black Journalists in Philadelphia; on Thursday she joined Oprah Winfrey in Michigan at her "Unite for America" livestream event with 140 different grassroots organizations; and on Friday she visits Wisconsin.

3. SUPREME COURT. The Supreme Court is adjourned

and will reconvene on Monday, Oct. 7. According to an annual survey announced Friday by the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg Public Policy Center, 2/3rds of Americans support imposing term limits on Supreme Court justices and 8 in 10 support the creation of an enforceable ethics code for the high court. Only 3 in 10 support expanding the size of the court from its current 9 justices, but nearly half support allowing the public to vote to overturn Supreme Court decisions on controversial issues. President Biden has called for 18-year term limits for the justices, with future presidents able to nominate a justice every 2 years.

4. FEDERAL RESERVE.

The Federal Reserve was widely expected to lower interest rates at its 2-day Federal Open Market Committee

meeting that started on Tuesday. By year's end, futures markets expect the Fed to cut its key short-term rate three times by a total of as much as a percentage point ...

In related news, gas prices are down nearly 35% from the July 2022 peak of just over \$5 a gallon, with economists predicting further declines for an average price dipping below the \$3 per gallon mark as early as October.

5. EDUCATION. On September 13, the U.S. Education Department announced that it would extend the deadline for institutions to provide information on their Title IV students under "financial value transparency" (FVT) and "gainful employment" (GE) regulations to January 15. The original deadline was July 1, which the Education Department had earlier delayed to October 1. This new deadline gives institu-

tions more time to provide the necessary data for the Education Department's new information framework, which is a key part of the Biden administration's higher education accountability initiative. While much of the required data is already being reported by colleges for Title IV compliance purposes, some elements are new and will need to be obtained by colleges. Additionally, a small number of community college certificate programs are likely to lose their student aid approval under the GE rules, which will have a greater impact on for-profit institutions.

In 2008, we witnessed a barrage of racist attacks against Barack Obama as he campaigned to become the first Black president of the United States. Yet, fast forward to today, and the

racial and sexist vitriol being thrown at Kamala Harris, in her quest to make history as the first woman and first woman of color to seek the presidency, eclipses even that. Her qualifications, her race, her name, her laugh everything is fair game in this latest round of identitybased criticism. But while this may feel disheartening, I want to encourage you to not give in to despair. Instead, let us embrace the mentality of marathoners, not sprinters.

Sprinters race over short distances, their goal is to get to the finish line in a matter of seconds. Marathoners, by contrast, run races that stretch for miles, requiring endurance, patience, and an unshakeable belief in their ability to finish, no matter how grueling the journey. And the truth is, this battle for Kamala Harris—and for all of us—requires the mindset of a marathon runner.



I remember this lesson from my daughter Katie, who distinguished herself as a long-distance runner throughout high school and college. She was often one of a few Black athletes running those long races, while most of her peers gravitated toward the shorter sprints. This trend, unfortunately, seems to mirror our approach to social and political challenges, as well. Too often, we excel in the short term but fall short in the long run.

This is where we need to change. With Kamala Harris, we can win the White House, but only if we think like marathoners. If we get caught up in the daily news cycles and polls, we risk losing heart, letting doubts creep in. But if we commit to the long game—organizing, registering voters, turning out the base, sending a contribution that we can afford, and ensuring that everyone, especially our young and disillusioned Black men, understands the power of their vote—we can achieve victory. A short-term focus may cause us to lose hope when we hit obstacles. But if we embrace

the marathon mindset, we can push through, seeing beyond today's hurdles to the ultimate prize. As the saying goes: "VOTE and the choice is yours. DON'T VOTE and the choice is theirs. DON'T REGISTER, and you'll have no choice."

I recently came across a poem that beautifully encapsulates this idea. It's about the biblical story of Joseph, who endured years of hardship—betrayed, enslaved, imprisoned—before rising to a position of immense power and influence. His early years were a sprint of suffering, but the marathon of his life brought triumph. Like Joseph, we must keep the faith through the long, dark days. Kamala Harris's campaign is about more than just one election cycle—it's about building a future that serves all of us. Let's commit to running the marathon with her. Let's endure, and when we cross the finish line, the victory will be sweeter for having fought so hard to get there. Until next week ...

Is Donald Trump a 21st century Ahithophel?

More than 67 million people watched the September 10th presidential debate. When VP Kamala Harris bested Donald Trump, here she exhibited deftly her tools learned as past prosecutor to political prodigy to now show presidential timber.

Some 200+ GOP leaders and staffers from George W. Bush, John McCain and Mitt Romney campaigns are now endorsing Harris. Many of them like former Bush VP Dick Cheney and his daughter former congresswoman Liz Cheney feel that Trump has abandoned long-standing Republican values and traditions and turned their Grand Old Party into a shameless cult of personality. Trump, they feel, has betrayed them, just like David felt about Ahithophel.

Once exposed by each side as a traitor, Ahithophel (translated, "brother of ruin or folly") "put his household in order, and hanged himself and died" 2 Samuel 17:23.

Speak truth even when it's painful to do so. Don't let your false claims disqualify you or make you hang yourself! When identified as doing wrong, "put your household in order" by moving quickly to admit and correct your missteps, and move upward and forward to your next challenge.

Rosetta James Foundation "Spotlight on Our Elders" ... Featuring **Rev. Dr. Mitchell Walker**

Pastor Mitchell M. Walker, Sr., is a native of Dyersburg, Tennessee. The older of two sons, he was born on December 11, 1952, to Tom Millard and Zella Mai Walker. He began preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ at age 4 years old at the then Rocksprings (Colored) Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Graduating from Dyersburg High School in 1970, Pastor Walker earned the Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from Bethel University in 1974. In 1977, he acquired the Master of Divinity degree in Christian education from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. In 1996, he graduated with the Doctor of Ministry degree with a pastoral care/counseling emphasis from Columbia Theological Seminary. The religious leader obtained a Graduate Certificate in Addiction Counseling from Memphis Theological Seminary in 2011.

Beginning September 1, 2000, Dr. Walker began as Pastor of the Church Street Presbyterian Church in America (CPCA) family in Huntsville, Alabama. This is after serving 23+ years as Pastor of St. James CPCA in Cleveland, Tennessee, as well as other pastoral leadership responsibilities since the age of 16. At Church

Street, Senior Pastor Walker is responsible for leading in preaching, teaching, worship, pastoral care, administrative responsibilities, as well as community involvements/ engagements. The ministerial leader further assists the congregation in planning for present-to-future visioning matters pertaining to both inreach and outreach, which includes the implementation of the construction and completion of a new church facility in 2018.

Pastor Walker has enjoyed a nearly 22-year affiliation with the Huntsville Bible College (HBC). Beginning as an Instructor in August 2002, he has continued to provide vision and guidance as its Dean of Graduate Studies since May 2017. Being tasked by the former HBC President, he created a doctoral program, Ft. Campbell. In this post, submitted and approved by the HBC Board of Directors and by the Association of Higher Biblical Education (ABHE), with its 5th Cohort.

As former Moderator of the Huntsville Presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, Dr. Mitchell served as the



elected presiding officer of the 19 congregations of the Huntsville Presbytery. In addition to several elected and appointed positions of service, he served as Moderator of the national General Assembly of the CPCA, from 1985-1987.

A former Honor Graduate Military Chaplain for the TN Army National Guard and the United States Army Reserve in Chattanooga, Tennessee, he served over a decade, including at the Headquarters Unit that was the backfield unit to Chaplain Walker administered the Commander's religious and morale program and led training in suicide prevention, among other responsibilities as assigned.
