AAMU Prez Testifies Before Congress on Behalf of Agriculture

Alabama A&M University (AAMU) President Daniel K. Wims testified before Congress recently on the urgent need to strengthen America's agricultural defenses against emerging threats.

Wims appeared before the House Homeland Security Subcommittee on Emergency Management and Technology during its hearing, "Surveying the Threat of Agroterrorism: Perspectives on Food, Agriculture, and Veterinary Defense."

The President was introduced by Subcommittee Chairman Rep. Dale Strong (R-AL), a former Madison County Commission chair, who praised Alabama A&M and Auburn University as "pillars of strength" in the state.

When asked to share his concerns about foreign acquisitions of farmland and the biggest risk when adversaries acquire U.S. farmland, Wims responded with: "Our farmers and producers throughout the Southeast are very open and very vulnerable. If they lose a season, they essentially lose the means to support their families and maintain their farms.



Awareness, education, and technical assistance are essential through our Cooperative Extension System, but that requires funding and stronger collaboration between research and extension, particularly against the terrorism dangers we face."

Additionally, he emphasized that securing America's food system demands funding, resources, research, and time, and he urged lawmakers to support strategies that merge traditional agriculture with modern technology. "We think that awareness, as well as education and technical assistance, with very clear and concise research to produce data-driven information from our researchers, but as my colleague on the

of food. I also think that the type and way that we produce, process and then distribute food has to be carefully studied in terms of the dangers that we face relative to a potential threat of having access to food systems and the way that we distribute and store food," he added.

wims testified alongside a panel that included Cris Young, DVM, MPH, DACVPM, COL USA (Ret.), professor of practice at Auburn University's College of Veterinary
Medicine; Marty Vanier,
DVM, director of the
National Agricultural
Biosecurity Center at
Kansas State University;
and Asha M. George,
DrPH, executive director of
the Bipartisan Commission
on Biodefense.

Together, they called for expanded research, stronger partnerships, and sustained investment to guard against disruptions to America's food supply.

panel said, that requires funding, and there has to be a better and closer collaboration between research and extension, particularly relative to terrorism dangers that we face. The challenge with us is being able to marry the agricultural sciences and research extension agents with our computer scientists and those professionally prepared in artificial intelligence and cybersecurity. We have not done a good job with that," said Wims.

Drawing from his own campus perspective, Wims also underscored food system vulnerabilities.

"We need systems in place – artificial intelligence, cybersecurity – to protect not just production but also the distribution, dissemination, and storage


When we decide to follow the devil, we end up

May God grant you



How to Spot the Brilliant Leader - in You?

Forbes Magazine contributor Jason Walker's How To Spot A Truly Brilliant Leader —The Psychology Behind Their Edge recently observed that "brilliance in leadership isn't about being the loudest voice or having all the answers. It's about a mindset and psychological habits that inspire trust, creativity, and progress."

His recommended habits overlap almost perfectly with Ego-holism Recovering (EHR) — our 10-step process for transforming leadership through ego management.

1. Take humility: the courage to say "I don't know," "I was wrong," or "I need help." This echoes the EHR pre-steps: Target the Problem, Own the Problem, and Proceed to Action.



2. Or **curiosity**: Walker urges leaders to read constantly

and explore outside their field. In EHR Step 3, we stress "eye listening" — reading both people and information to uncover new insights.

- 3. Walker's call for **intentional listening** reinforces one of EHR's foundational lessons: LISTEN and SILENT are spelled with the same letters. Great leaders often speak less and observe more.
- 4. His counsel to **stay agile** and **make time to play** likewise aligns with EHR's emphasis on open-mindedness and creativity. The mind, like a parachute, works best when open.
- 5. Walker concludes: brilliant leaders are lifelong learners, curious, attentive, and agile. EHR concludes: recovering ego-holics, or what I call REEL people Recovering Ego-holics and Emerging Leaders have the same potential.

Walker's insights and EHR's steps are not competing but complementary. Together, they point us toward a healthier, more fruitful model of leadership brilliance.



Mary Ann May Flowers, a native of Washington County, (Millry) Alabama, is the youngest of seven children born to Alonza James May and Izora Holcombe May. She attended Koenton High School, Koenton, Alabama and North Central High School, Chatom, Alabama. After completing high school in 1967, she followed in the footsteps of her uncle, aunt and two brothers. Therefore, she matriculated to Alabama A&M University, Normal, Alabama. While at AAMU, she was a member of the track and field team, Phi Beta Lambda Business Club and in the spring of 1969 joined Gamma Mu Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., where she served as epistelous. In 1971 she earned a B.S. degree in Business Education with a minor in Economics. In 1979 she earned a M.S. degree in Vocational Business Education.

Mrs. Flowers began an adventurous career, one which she will never forget, the Fall of 1971. She was employed with the Perry County School System, Marion, Alabama, for 31 years, teaching at only two schools, East Perry High School, Suttle, Alabama, for one year, and Robert C. Hatch High School, Uniontown, Alabama, for 30 years. During her tenure, she taught an array of related Business Courses as well as Economics. One of the greatest, beloved parts of her career was her FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America) student

organization, which was an integral part of the program which she implemented in 1989. Her students traveled all over the United States serving as a state officer and competing in several competitive events, many of which they won.

After retiring in 2002, she still wanted to make a difference in the lives of students, as well as improved the community in which she lived. She wrote a grant to Alabama Power Company and was granted enough money to buy 10 computers, which she used to open up a computer lab in the local library. In the afternoon, she taught basic computer skills to adults on those computers. From 2005-2010, she was contracted by the Perry County School System to serve as a Technology Consultant, where she implanted training sessions for teachers to improve computer skills, as well as set up computer labs with access to internet. In 2010-2011, she was employed as an Adult Job Coach teacher by Wallace Community College Selma, to prepare adult students for the world of work.

While residing in Uniontown for 44 years, she participated in many community and civic activities. She was a member of First Missionary Baptist Church, where she served as youth director, chief usher, matron, missionary society president, Youth Sunday School teacher, Secretary of Trustee Board, and Chairperson of



the Southwest Deacon and Trustee Wives Ministry. She also served on Uniontown Library Board, Recreation Board, Uniontown Cares and a member of the Alabama Democratic Conference. She has been a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., for 55 years ... She holds membership with St. Mary Chapter No. 367 OES Orrville, Alabama and has membership with PCERA, NEA, and AEA.

After relocating to Huntsville, Alabama in 2015, she joined First Missionary Baptist Church in 2017 where she serves on the Intermediate Usher Ministry, Missionary Society (Circle No. 2), Congregational Care Lay Ministry and volunteers for the Downtown Rescue Mission and other activities.

Her beloved late husband, Johnny L. Flowers, was a County Commisioner. They were blessed with two sons, Mallory Hughes Flowers of Clinton, MS; Maynard Radale Flowers of Round, Rock, TX.



Alabama A&M University is proud to announce distinguished alumnus Freeman Holifield, Sr. '66 has been selected for induction into the National Black College Alumni (NBCA) Hall of Fame. The ceremony will take place on Saturday, September 27, 2025, at the Hyatt Regency in Atlanta, Georgia.

Holifield will be recognized in the Government category for his groundbreaking career and service. A U.S. Army veteran, he began his career as one of the first African American officers in the Huntsville Police Department before joining the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile & Munitions Center and School, where



he achieved multiple historic "firsts" over a 33-year federal career. His leadership expanded education services both in the United States and abroad, earning him widespread recognition and respect.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, Holifield has been a lifelong advocate for Alabama A&M University and his community, supporting higher education, civic leadership, and opportunities for the next generation.

The 40th Annual NBCA Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony will feature 14 honorees across fields including education, industry, law, medicine, science, athletics, art, business, entertainment, and lifetime achievement. Hosting the ceremony will be awardwinning journalist Monica Pearson and Kevin Frazier, co-host of "Entertainment Tonight."

The induction is part of the broader NBCA Hall of

Fame Weekend, which also includes the Competition of Black College Queens, Thomas W. Dortch, Jr. HBCU Golf Classic, Legacy of Leaders Alumni Honors, Call to Womanhood and Call to Manhood Symposiums, and other programs designed to celebrate excellence and empower the


HBCU community.


