### Huntsville a Step Closer to New CSI Facility

Mayor Tommy Battle and other City leaders have broken ground on the Huntsville Police Department's (HPD) new crime scene investigation (CSI) facility, a transformative project that will enhance \$9.6 million, with the department's

ability to serve and protect the community.

The new facility is located at 616 Wheeler Ave. near Huntsville Police Headquarters. The total cost of construction is just over completion slated

for early summer 2025. The facility will be equipped with

state-of-the-art labs, office space, evidence processing areas and vehicle processing bays. The campus will also feature a separate, climate-controlled

13,500-square-foot building dedicated to vehicle and evidence storage.

### Breast Cancer: The Year-Round Info Guide

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women, as well as among Black women. And although breast cancer is the most common cancer, it remains the second leading cause of cancer-related death among women behind cancer of the lungs.

Very disturbing disparities exist between Black women and white women when it comes to breast cancer screening, diagnosis, and survival, and these will be outlined below.

Breast cancer is a malignant growth or tumor that frequently begins to manifest in the milk ducts or lobules of either breast. Breast cancer can

be divided into two groups: invasive and non-invasive cancers. Non-invasive breast cancers are also called "carcinoma in situ" and are generally confined to the duct areas without affecting the surrounding tissue.

Non-invasive breast cancers can be subcategorized as "ductal carcinoma in situ" (DCIS) and "lobular carcinoma

in situ" (LCIS). LCIS is actually not considered cancer, per se. Rather, it is seen as a warning sign that can potentially lead to invasive can-

ducts but then spread into surrounding breast tissue, and can often further cer when undetected. metastasize to the

lungs, brain, liver, bones, and other major organs. About 80 percent of invasive breast cancers fall into the category of invasive ductal carcinoma. (See p. 9)

Here are the top issues and events in Washington for this week:

1. CONGRESS. The House and Senate are in recess until November 12. 2. THE WHITE HOUSE. Upon returning from Germany, President Biden spent the weekend at Camp David. On Tuesday, President Biden traveled to New Hampshire for an event highlighting the Administration's work to lower prescription drug costs. He was in Arizona on Thursday

and Friday for an official event.

3. SUPREME COURT. The Supreme Court last Wednesday refused a request from GOP-led states to put a new air pollutant regulation from the EPA on hold while a challenge to the rule moves through the lower courts. The rule would reduce carbon dioxide emissions by requiring some power plants to meet emissions standards similar to what they would achieve using 90% carbon capture.

SPENDING. Last Thursday, the Commerce Department announced that retail sales rose a strong 0.4% in September (up from a 0.1% increase in August), as spending at clothing shops,

other EPA rules on hold.

4. CONSUMER

restaurants, and grocery stores jumped, while spending at furniture shops and electronics stores fell.

5. EDUCATION. On October 15, Virginia Foxx (R-NC) and Aaron Bean (R-FL) sent a letter to Education Secretary Miguel Cardona, expressing concerns that the proposed changes to the Perkins V state plan guides may exceed the department's authority. They argue these changes could burden career and technical education (CTE) programs, state agencies, and school districts. The updates aim to standardize how states collect and report CTE student performance data, but CTE advocates warn that states may need to submit new or amended four-year plans by 2026, which could be challenging since many have just completed their current plans.

6. CAMPAIGN EVENTS. On Monday, Vice President Harris (who turned 60 on Sunday) campaigned with former

GOP Congresswoman Liz Cheney (R-WY) in suburban neighborhoods in Philadelphia, Detroit, and Milwaukee. On Wednesday, Harris headlined a town hall on CNN hosted by Anderson Cooper. On Thursday, Harris campaigned with former President Obama in Georgia and with former First Lady Michelle Obama on Saturday in Michigan. On Monday, former President Trump held a rally in Greenville, NC, a rally on Wednesday in Duluth, GA, and a rally on Thursday in Las Vegas. As of Sunday

night, NBC News reported that 13.7 million voters have already cast their votes by either early in-person voting or mail-in ballots (46% Democrats to 36% Republicans), which is approaching 10% of the total number of voters who voted in the 2020 election (158.4 million voters).

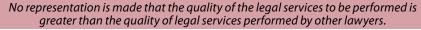

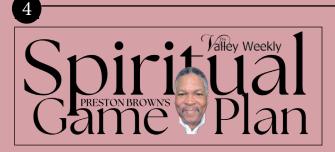

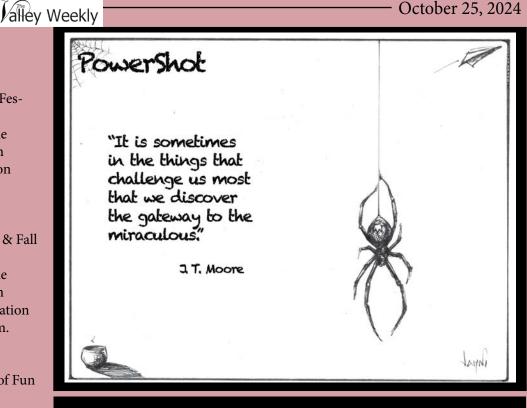
### **Breast Cancer: The Year-Round Info Guide**

BREAST CANCER STAGES: Stage 0. breast cancer is known as carcinoma in situ, the most common being DCIS, as described on Page 1; Stage 1. Breast cancer signifies early invasive cancer in which the tumor has not spread beyond the breast tissue and is no more than <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of an inch in diameter; Stage 2. Breast cancer involves a tumor between <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of an inch and 2 inches in diameter with some involvement of the local lymph nodes under the arm; Stage 3. Breast cancer can involve a combination of various factors, including larger tumor mass, involvement of lymph nodes behind the breast bone, tumor spread into the chest wall or skin of the breast, or under or above the collar bone. Stage 3 also may manifest as inflammatory breast cancer, a rare form of breast cancer wherein the breast becomes red and swollen due to the blockage of lymph vessels in the breast tissue and skin; Stage 4. Breast cancer involves the spreading of the disease to other parts of the body and distant organs, a process often referred to as metastasis.

#### Screening

Breast self-exam (BSE) is an important part of self-screening for women of all ages, although studies show that the percentage of women who practice regular monthly BSE is relatively low.

Mammograms are a very crucial aspect of breast cancer screening and are still considered the best method of early detection. Starting at the age of 40, annual mammograms are recommended for all women, as well as an annual clinical breast exam by a qualified medical professional. - BlackDoctor.org

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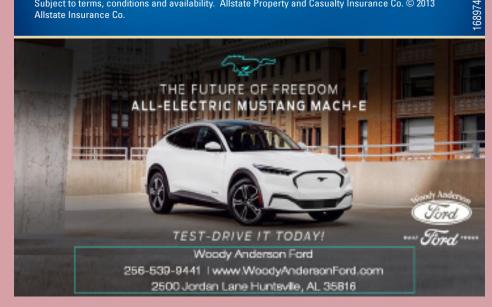

During his work in higher education, he held key positions in the Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers on the state and national levels, and was Forces Staff College affiliated with other

Heyward holds a B.S. degree from South Carolina State University and an M.A. from Shippensburg State University. He graduated from the Armed and the U.S. Army Per-



sonnel Management for **Executives Program.** Heyward was also a former Paratrooper and received numerous military awards and citations, including the Legion of Merit.

Heyward remained active in community activities, including membership and past president of the local graduate chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.; member of Epsilon Kappa Boule, Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity; holds membership in the Royal College of Papal Knights in the Americas; and more.

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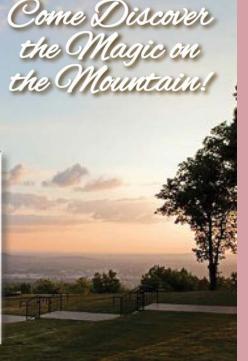

The Medicare Open Enrollment period has begun. Consumers must enroll by December 7 for coverage beginning January 1.

TARCOG is available to assist citizens in DeKalb, Jackson, Limestone, Madison and Marshall counties with the open enrollment process, said Executive Director Michelle Gilliam Jordan.

Open enrollment is the opportunity for participants to compare health and prescription drug plans or add extra benefits. If they haven't done so already, Jordan encourages all participants to review

their plans before the deadline.

All eligible participants should take advantage of open enrollment to ensure they have the right Medicare plan for their individual needs.

During the annual enrollment period, participants may:

- Drop a Medicare Advantage Plan
- Cancel an existing Part
- D plan
- Enroll in a Part D plan
- Change from one Medicare Advantage plan to a different one
- Change from Medicare to a Medicare Advantage

plan • Change from one Part D prescription drug plan to another

Through the Alabama State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) Program, certified counselors and volunteers throughout the state are committed to helping Medicare beneficiaries make informed choices regarding health benefits at no charge to Medicare recipients.

By sunset Friday a calming hush had come to our humble abode. For the next 24 hours we were immersed in restfulness, reading, nature, communion, and religious services. The sabbath would be closed out with song, "day is dying in the west, heaven is touching earth with rest..." We recognized the sabbath as the seventh day of the week as noted in the Torah in the book of Exodus, verses 8-11. From a little tot on up, each week we would recite the verses beginning with "Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy."

The ultimate reason for

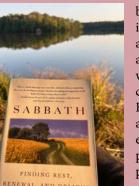

a book entitled Sabbath, by Wayne Muller. The understated cover of the paperback book reached out to me from the shelf. It felt soothing in my hands with it's earthy colors woodland imagery. It's subtitled Finding Rest, Renewal, and Delight In Our Busy Lives. For me it was a much needed reminder to reincorporate the joy and balance of the Sabbath in my life. The verse admonishes us to remember the sabbath, as though it was known that we would be prone to forget it.

The sabbath is for everyone. We can start by designating specific times each week for rest and reflection. This sacred time can be marked by personal rituals-like lighting a candle or spending time in nature-to signal a transition into relaxation. Disconnecting from screens and social media

Associate Professor of Mathematics, Dr. Congxiao Liu, has been awarded a \$322,875 grant from the Department of Defense (DoD) to advance magnetic research and enhance STEM education at Alabama A&M University. The funding will support cutting-edge research and the creation of two new courses, significantly benefiting the University's science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) students.

The one-year grant will be used to acquire a stateof-the-art Vibrating Sample Magnetometer (VSM)-

Torque system, essential for the study of magnetic materials. Liu, who has over 30 years of experience in magnetics research and has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals, emphasized the importance of this award for both research and

education.

"This grant is a major milestone for my research and for AAMU," said Liu. "The VSM-Torque system will allow us to conduct

high-quality research in magnetism. Magnetic ma-

terials are crucial in modern nanotechnology with wide-ranging applications. The discovery of the giant magnetoresistance effect, for example, revolutionized information technology, and magnetic media remains critical for cloud ARTHUR J. BOND HALL storage today."
