## **Marker to Commemorate Victims of Area Lynchings**

The Madison County Remembrance Project (MCRP) invites the public to "a significant event" on Saturday, December 7, at 2 p.m. at 5905 Higdon Road NE (District No. 17 Masonic Center), Huntsville, Ala.

MCRP members have collected soil for eight of the 10 documented lynching victims in



Madison County, and the organization will honor their lives and stories.

MCRP will dedicate Madison County's first racial terror lynching historical marker, commemorating the life of Mr. Robert Mosley, who was lynched near this site on March 21, 1890.

This ceremony, held in partnership with District No. 17 Masonic Center and the Equal Justice Initiative, will honor his memory, confront this painful chapter of history, and reaffirm the community's commitment to justice and unity.

According to organizers, the event will take place, rain or shine, with cancellation only in case of severe weather.

# **New TARCOG Facility in the Works**

A vacant oneacre lot of Alabama red clay on Corporate Drive in the Mid City District will transform over the next year to feature a new 25,000 square foot office building for TARCOG.

"We are very excited to have reached this point," said Executive Director Michelle Jordan. "It's taken nearly two years of



thoughtful planning, but we believe the building plan is perfect for our needs now and into the future." Architect Les Tillery, principal with Fuqua Architects, said the modern two-story building will be constructed of structural steel, brick and metal siding.

"We have been working in harmony with the design guidelines and standards at Mid City to complement the aesthetic standards set by them," Les said.

Once started, construction should take a year to complete. TARCOG's new building will be built across the street from the Dynetics Mid City Campus at 4991 Corporate Drive NW.

# Notes of a Native Son: UNBROKEN PARADOX

I am taking a departure from my normal and sharing a work of visual art. "Unbroken Paradox" honors the extraordinary life of William Hooper Councill, a former enslaved man among men who rose from the red dust of Alabama to become the founder and first president of what is now Alabama A&M University. This work, created with red clay taken from the grounds of his enslavement and the university he

built, embodies the

profound duality of

his journey—pain and triumph, oppression and liberation, roots and ascension.

I was told by a professor while an undergrad at Alabama A&M

University that "Your success is inevitable because this Alabama Red Clay is rich with the blood of your ancestors." Those words transformed me from a witness to a man on and in purpose. The red clay is more than a medium; it is history itself, rich with the essence of the land that bore witness to Councill's transformation. From the soil of hardship grew a legacy of

excellence, a paradox of unbroken spirit in the face of unimaginable adversity. This work connects past struggles to present victories, serving as a timeless reminder that greatness can emerge from even the harshest conditions.

"Unbroken Paradox" is a piece of history that celebrates the resilience, vision, and courage of one

of Alabama's greatest pioneers. It's a testament to the power of education to uplift and transform lives, just as Councill did for countless others. This work is charged with the "blood" of our ancestors. "Unbroken Paradox" is not merely a painting; it is a legacy, a story of perseverance, and a beacon of inspiration for generations to come.



Ahh, December!



#### Celebrating 32 Years of "Handel's Messiah: A Soulful Celebration"

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given, . . ." - Isaiah 9:6



As we move into this holiday season of celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ referenced in the above Bible text, let me introduce you to the 32th anniversary of a Christmas classic - with a local connection.

In 1992, *Handel's Messiah: A Soulful Celebration* debuted as a re-interpretation of composer George Frideric Handel's 1741 oratorio.

This 75-minute presentation was co-produced by Huntsville, Alabama native Mervyn Warren, pictured above.

A 1985 Oakwood College graduate and original member of its Grammy Award-winning Take 6 a cappella sextet, Warren's re-interpretation showcased multiple genres of African American music.

For example, he remixed Handel's original opening *Overture* to create *Overture*: *A Partial History of Black Music*, *Overture*; it featured such African-American genres as spirituals, hip-hop, R&B, ragtime, big band, jazz fusion, and blues.

To conclude this 16-song album, Quincy Jones conducted the Hallelujah Chorus finale *Hallelujah!*, which featured an All-Star cast of Black entertainers; view the list at *Handel's Messiah: A Soulful Celebration* - Wikipedia.

#### The Results?

A Soulful Celebration won the 1992 Grammy and Dove Awards for Best Contemporary Soul Gospel Album and Contemporary Gospel Album of the Year, respectively; also in 1992, it charted on *The Top Gospel Albums* (#3), *Top R&B/Hip-Hop Albums* (11), *Top Contemporary Christian Albums* (13), and *The Billboard* 200 (82).

Shortly after receiving their 1992 Grammy Awards, I was privileged to bring "Skipper" Warren to Hampton University in March 1993, to conduct a music workshop concluding with Warren guest-conducting *Hallelujah!* with HU's His Chosen Sound gospel choir.




